


# CLASS HISTORY

It was in this year that the Curtis Publishing Co. began an annual subscription drive which was given to the Juniors. We continued our dramatizations with two plays. The first, "For Pete's Sake", was again directed



by Mrs. Foster. The second, "M'Liss", was sponsored by Mrs. Cordelia Freeland. Jack Williams, a new member of the class, strengthened our crew of ball players.

We organized the class early so that we might select our rings and invitations. Late in the year, our president had to relinquish his office when he left school. The vice-president, Verl Masters, filled the vacancy in his capacity. Our finale in Lone Oak's stage presentations was made when we offered "The Ghost Train", under the direction of Miss Norma Billington. All seven of our cagesters participated in the splendid Purple Flash team during the 1942 hardwood this year.

While we make no claims of unusual greatness, we have had our shares in the dramatics, debating, athletics and many other activities of Lone Oak. We will be missed for a while until others fill our places, but we will not forget for nothing can erase from our memories the four years of our high school career, four years of success, failure, joy and heartbreak. # CLASS PROPHECY



The reminicising of the women was momentarily interrupted as the butler brings in the evening paper and who should they see in the headlines but Norma J.





James Hayden wills his speed and basket ball skill to James Reed, who could use a little exer-



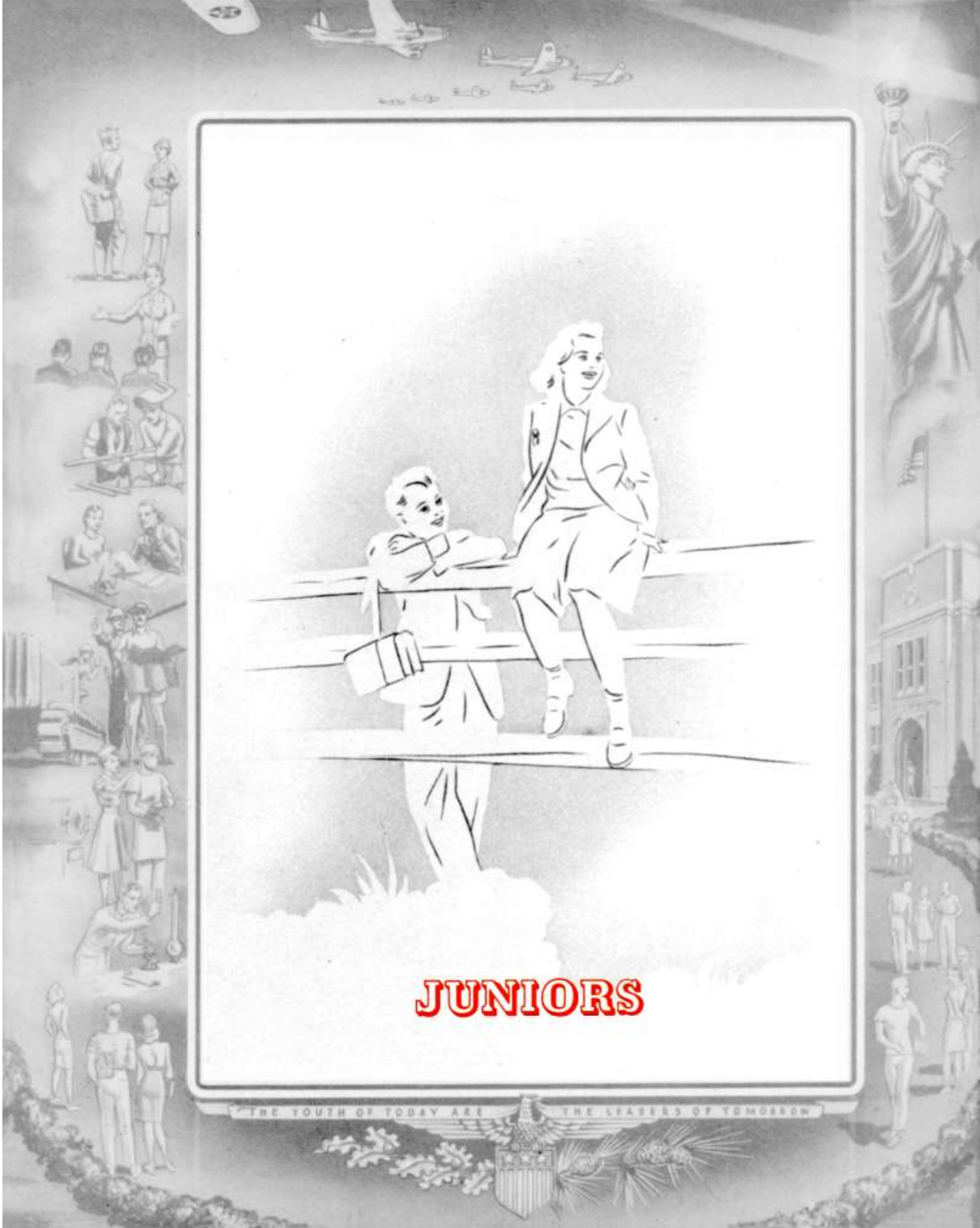

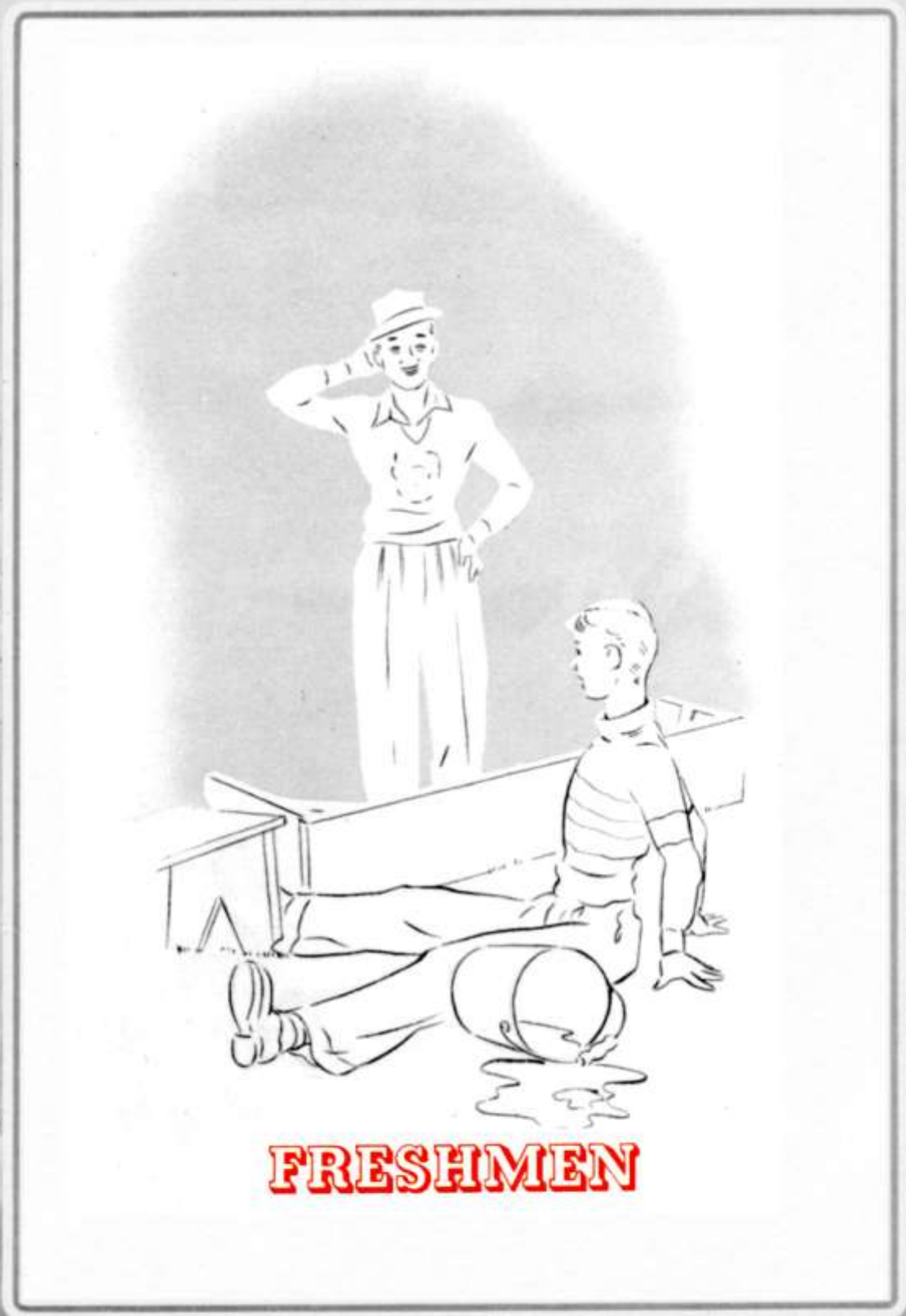

Carl Riddell and Alton Ross are our outstanding students scholastically.





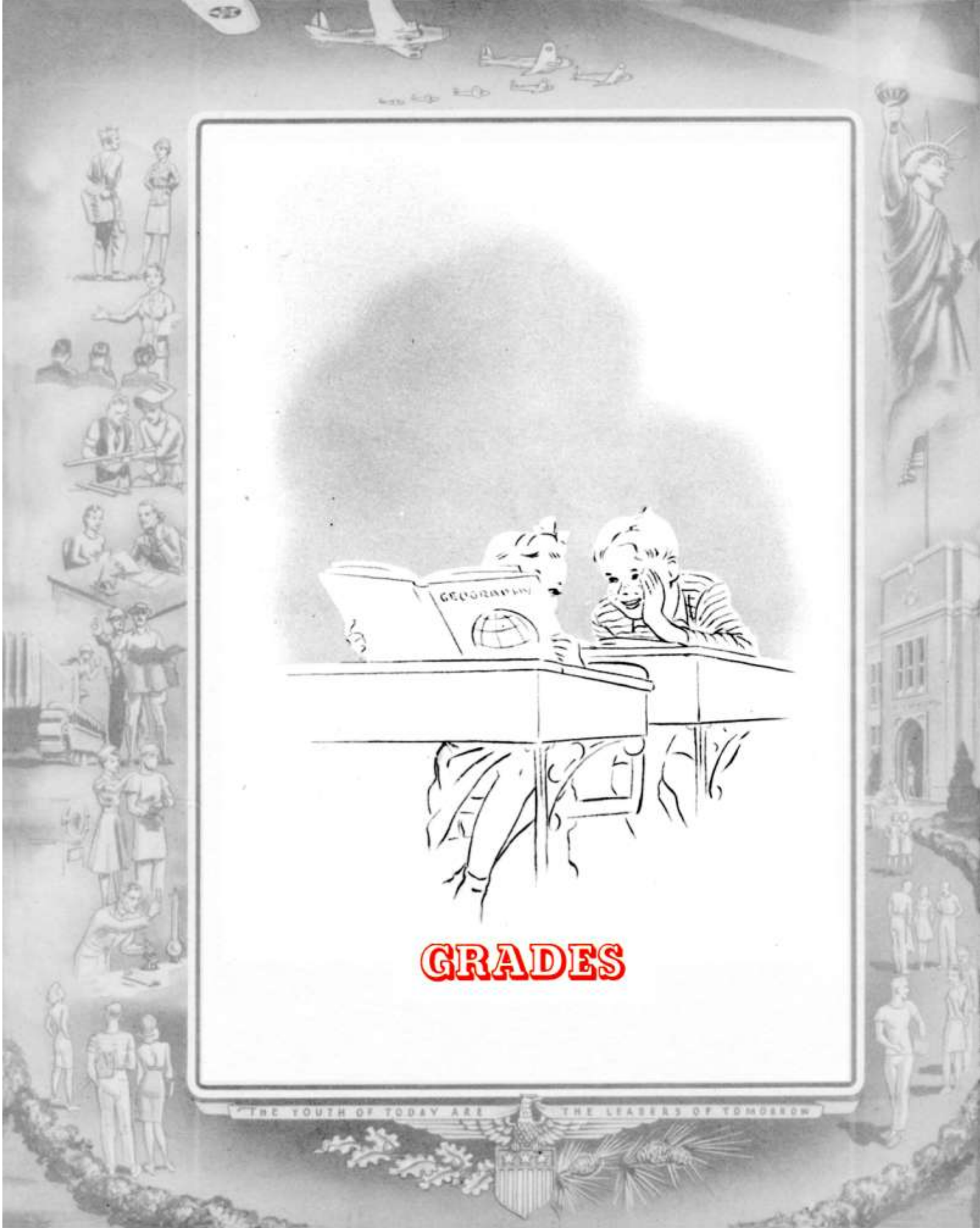

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# SPORTS REVIEW

**EARL CLYMER**--Earl came to Lone Oak from Brazelton when he was in the 8th grade and made the squad. This is his third year to letter at Lone Oak but he is only a Sophomore. Earl is a good offensive and backboard man. He was a regular forward on the 1941-42 team and scored 169 points this year to come in second in individual points scored.

**JAMES HAYDEN**--Another 3 letterman and high scorer of the year. Hayden played forward and had a good eye for the basket. He was the fastest man on the squad. James scored 171 points during the season. He is a Senior and will be missed next year.

**HARLAN WILLIAMS**--This was Cotton's first year at Lone Oak as he transferred from Reidland and made his letter at Lone Oak. He was the tallest man on the team, standing 6' 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", and is a good man on the offense and practically controls the rebounds against opponents. He was the regular center on the 1941-42 team and is a Junior. He is third highest scorer with 160 points.

**BILL OWENS**--Also a 3 letterman, Bill made the team as a Sophomore. He was the captain of the 1941-42 team and held down a regular guard spot, but alternated a few games at forward. Bill came in fourth in individual scoring with 141 points. He is a Senior.

**SAM MAYHALL**--A 2 letterman, making the team as a Freshman. He was not eligible the first semester this year but was a regular guard at the end of the season. He was the best defensive man on the squad, stands 5' 11", weighs 180 pounds, and is a Junior.

**JACK OWENS**--With 2 letters to his credit, he has been on the team for 3 years. One of the tallest men on the team, 6'  $\frac{1}{2}$ ", he alternated at forward with James Hayden. Jack is a Senior and will be missed next year as he was a valuable man and good at grabbing rebounds.

**JACK WILLIAMS**--Lettering only one year, Jackie alternated at the guard post with Charles Lynn. Jackie came from Tilghman in his Junior year and was a fast man and good at crisp shots. He is a Senior, also.

**CHARLES LYNN**--Lettering 3 years, Chillie broke in on the team in his Sophomore year. He has been a valuable cog in Lone Oak's teams for the past 3 years. He is a Senior, too.

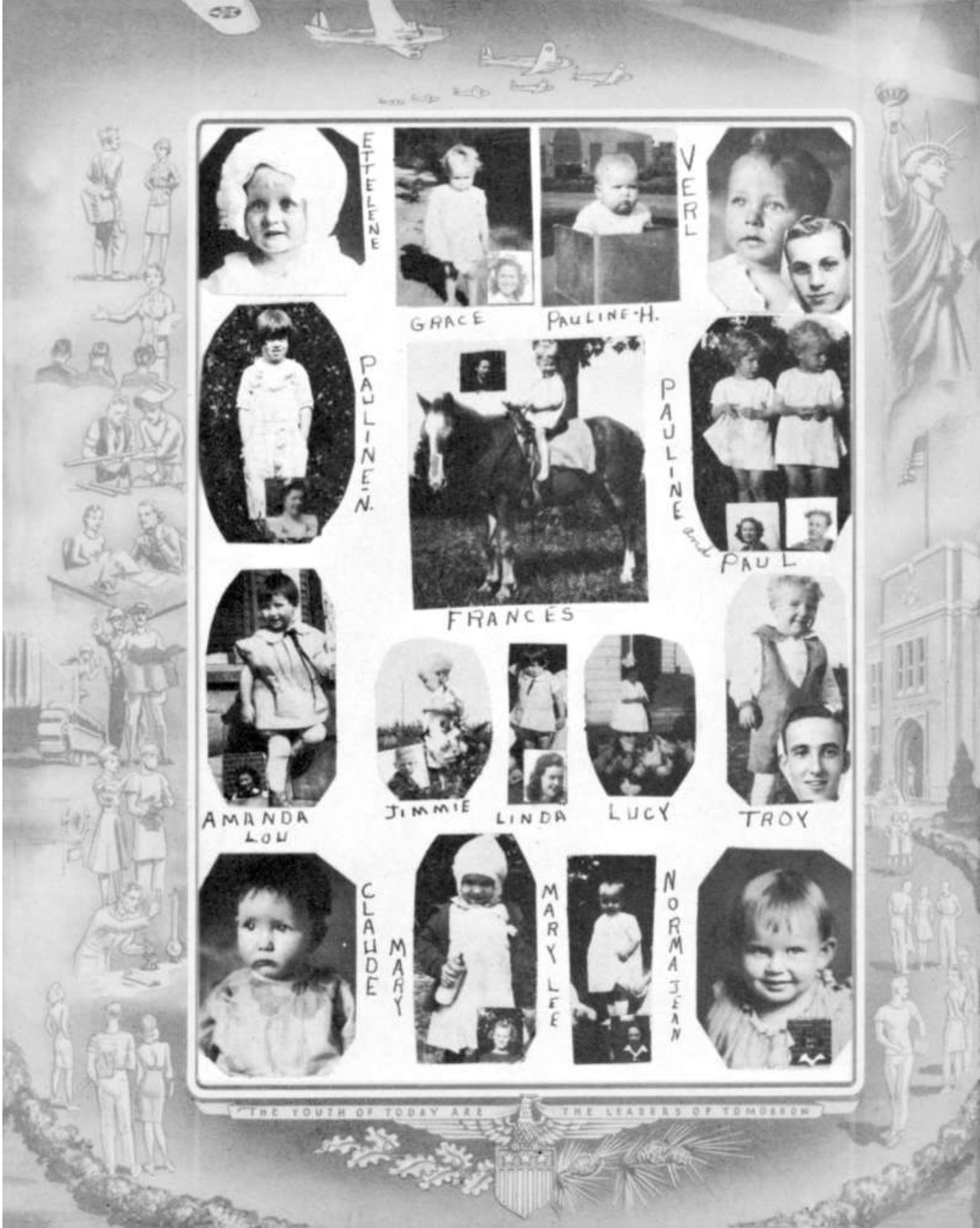
