On the night of November 6, 1945, about 800 people crowded our gymnasium to witness the crowning of the basketball queen. It was the largest crowd that has been in the gymnasium for years. The stage was beautifully decorated with the queen's throne and the chairs of the attendants. The color scheme was purple, gold, and white.

The music was presented by Mrs. Wickliffe. The program started with the basketball boys and cheerleaders running out on the floor from opposite directions and meeting at the steps to the stage. Meyerbeer's "Coronation March" was played while the queen and her attendants marched in.

Aimee Warner led the procession. She wore a white satin floor length gown with a high necked bolero that buttoned up the front. Betty Hopkins, wore a pink satin gown with a tight bodice and sweetheart neckline and full skirt. She carried carnations and chrysanthemums. Next came Norma Reber who was second in the queen contest, wearing a pink satin gown and full skirt. She carried pastel carnations. After her came Don Mac Andrus from the second grade. He carried a purple pillow bearing a gold sequined crown. Following him was Betty Sue Alderson carrying white baskets decorated with purple ribbons, and dropping chrysanthemums in the path of the queen, Lou Anna Beyer, a senior and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Beyer. Lou Anna, a very lovely and graceful queen, wore a black gown with a lace bodice and taffeta skirt with gold sequin designs at top of the skirt. Her bouquet was white carnations.

When the queen and her attendants reached their places the cheerleaders, Mayme Sue Vanvactor, Shirley Downing, Donna Baker, Martha Rushing and B. B. Hook, led the crowd in the "Loyalty Song." The captain of our team, John Bob Padgitt, placed the crown on the queen's head and handed her the basketball. The 1945-46 season was opened by the queen throwing the ball to our captain and wishing the team lots of luck. The Purple Flash demonstrated they had plenty of luck by winning the game with Symsonia that followed by a score of 31-20.

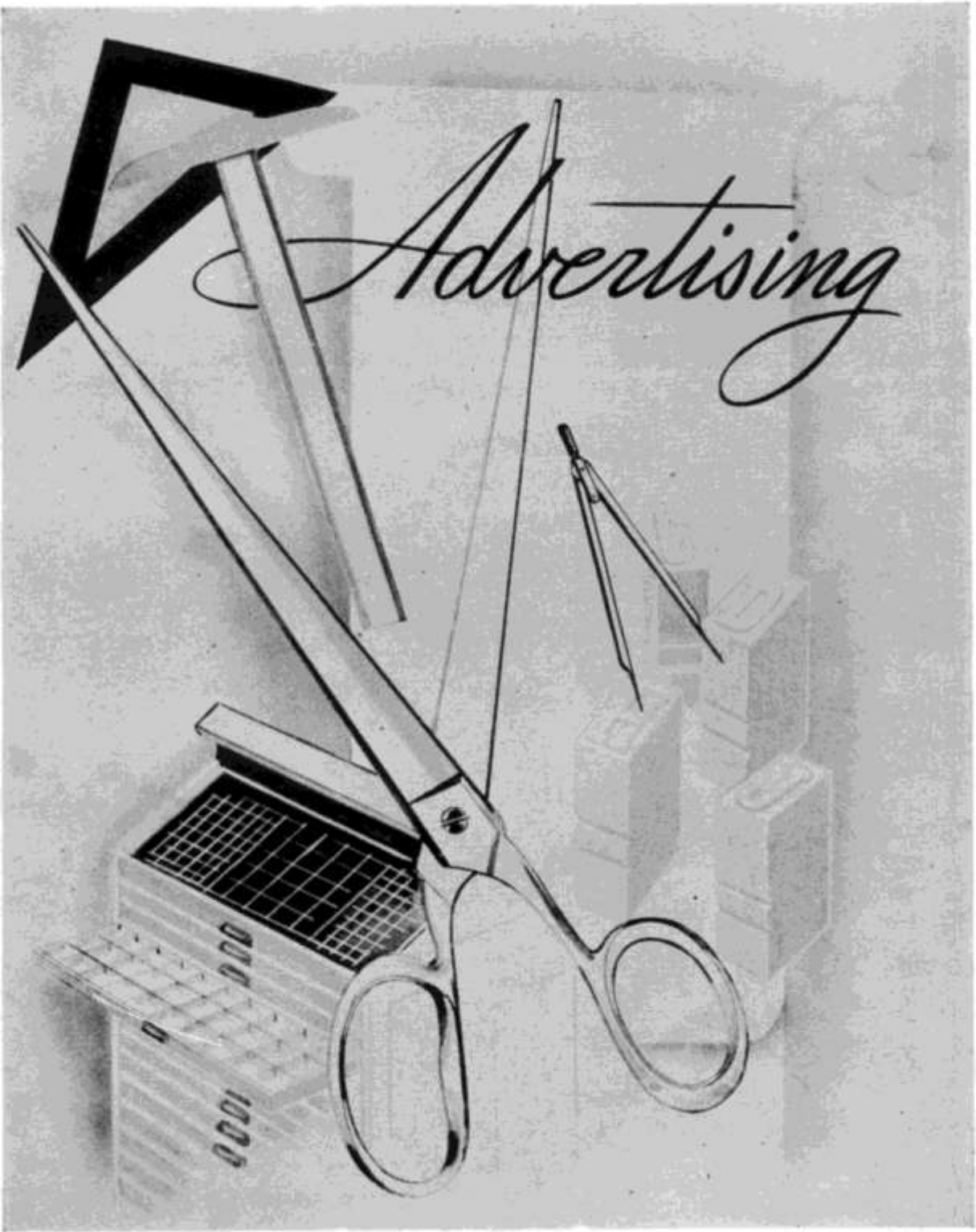
