Ancient Buried City Given To West Kentucky Baptist Hospital By Kings

Announcement was made Wednesday by Rev. George Phillips, Paducah, chairman of the board of trustees, of the gift of the Ancient Buried City at Wickliffe to the West Kentucky Memorial Hospital by the owners, Col. and Mrs. Fain White King.

Transfer of the property from Col. and Mrs. King to the hospital trustees was effected October 1, and management of the property was placed temporarily under the Rev. Robert Abernathy and Mrs. Abernathy, pending the appointment of a permanent board of managers and a permanent property manager by the hospital trustees.

The gift of the property valued at \$400,000 is a valuable asset to the hospital which will be built in Paducah when construction is possible.

The hospital trustees in making their announcement of the acquisition of the property stressed that it is a gift from Col. and Mrs. King and that none of the funds donated for the hospital building campaign had been used in effecting the transfer of the property nor

will any of these funds be used for the operation of the property. On the other hand, a separate bank account will be set up at Wickliffe to handle the funds derived from operation of the Ancient Buried City, and the net income from the property will be used exclusively for charity work in the hospital.

The hospital trustees voted Col. King a \$6,000 annuity as a meritorious award in recognition of the discoveries and scientific revelations made by the Kings.

The annuity will cease after the deaths of Col. and Mrs. King.

Should the property fail to produce enough revenue in any three months period to meet the annuity payments, the property can be returned by the hospital trustees to Col. and Mrs. King.

Col. King is a native of Paducah and was in the lumber business until he acquired the King Mounds in 1932 and began their exploration and operation. Mrs. King, a native of Seymour, Ill., is an ethnologist and author and has worked with her husband in the development of the King Mounds.
