



Douglas and Miss Betty Reynolds also sang solos.


A highlight of the program was introduction of Miss Reynolds, 18-year-old senior, as FFA queen and Harold Lynn, junior, as FFA king.

Children Under 16 Not Allowed To Pick Berries During School

Children under 16 cannot be hired to pick strawberries or harvest any other crop that moves in interstate commerce while schools in districts in which the minors live are in session.

The wage and hour division of the United States Department of Labor has asked school officials to pass the word along to farmers.

Students 16 or older will be allowed to work during school hours if they get a certificate of age from their county attendance officer.

The student workers must carry the certificates with them to show to any farmer who employs them.

Officials in the Wage and Hour Department stressed the fact that it is not their desire to penalize growers for employing minors in violation of the law, but that the law will be enforced, and growers violating the law will be penalized. Field men will check during the picking season.

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Health For All TB ISN'T "LICKED"

Complete victory over the enemy is the goal of every war. No military leader or soldier is satisfied with mere "progress" against the enemy.

So it is in the battle against a communicable disease such as tuberculosis. Progress has undoubtedly been made in this country against tuberculosis, which has been forced down since the turn of the century from first to seventh place as a cause of death. Yet tuberculosis today kills more people in "the prime of life"—young adults between 15 and 34—than any other disease.

Tuberculosis is taking close to 45,000 American lives annually. It is estimated there are approximately 500,000 cases of tuberculosis in the United States, but only half of these cases are known to the health authorities. Most of the 250,000 "unknown" cases are people who do not even know that they are ill, yet their lives are in danger and they may be spreading disease.

We must find those quarter-ofa-million unknown cases so that treatment can be provided for the individual and the spread of the disease prevented. And these unknown cases of TB can be found. They can be found by means of the chest X-ray examination of every adult, even apparently healthy ones. The X-ray can detect signs of tuberculosis even before there are obvious symptoms.

Case-finding is only one weapon against tuberculosis used in communities all over the country. Other major weapons include health education, treatment, rehabilitation and medical research.

The individual can take an active part in the nationwide battle against tuberculosis. First of all, he should have chest X-rays at least one a year. He should also find out what is being done to

Miss Barbara Polk, the music director, deserves a lot of credit for working with these students and making them a great success.

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
