My Most Unforgettable Character

Dr. Randolph Cook Gore was called the "Poor Man's Friend" by nearly everyone in the community. He felt it his duty to cure people, rich or poor, of their illness.

In his 48 years of practice in the community of Lone Oak and around McCracken County, he experienced many things that made his life a happy one.

Randolph Gore was left an orphan at the age of 14. He started working at the home of Dr. J. W. Mass, and became interested in the field of medicine. He saved enough money to start to school, although he worked at odd jobs while at the Barnes Medical College, St. Louis, Missouri.

The doctor was 24 when he began practicing in the small community of St. John. Two years later he moved his practice to Lone Oak. He met Alice Sanderson and married her a few years later. They had four children.

Aside from practicing medicine, Dr. Gore found time for civic affairs. He was a lay leader in the Lone Oak Methodist Church, which he helped build, a member of the McCracken County Medical Association, and helped establish the Old West Kentucky College, which was later converted into a high school.

Dr. Gore, or "Doc" as he was called by many of his friends, went out of his way to help other people with their problems and financial difficulties. While at the same time, he too, was having financial troubles.

Time and time again patients would ask if they might work for him in order to pay their doctor bill. The doctor did not have jobs for these people, he made jobs for them, not so that they might pay their bill, but so that they might have money to live on. He built a canning factory, a greenhouse, and bought farms where families could live.

During the flood of 1937, the doctor worked night and day calling on the sick. Pay was not expected, all he needed was a kind "Thank you Doc, I shall never forget how you pulled me through this one", to give him the strength to keep going.

One certain night, after a very tiring week, the doctor was called out on another case. It was late when he returned, and some of the "flood guest" that were staying in the home of the doctor and Mrs. Gore said, "Doc, did you have to stop by the road and take a nap". He laughed and said, "No, if you have to know--this case I was called out on was for a patient with pneumonia. I forgot to take my stethoscope from the car, and I was just too tired to go out and get it, so I laid my head on her chest and told her to count to ten. At that point I intended to stop her--when I woke up she was to 99.

One Sunday night the doctor came in after dark and found his wife very upset. She had tried to milk the cow, but Brownie insisted upon "kicking". The doctor was only too glad to milk the cow for "honey". Honey was the nickname he had for his wife and also for his animals. Up until this time Mrs. Gore had never heard her husband say one single curse word, and she herself had felt like saying one when she had tried to milk Brownie earlier in the evening. She wondered how the cow would affect the doctor's temper. When he went out to the barn, she climbed in the buggy, just outside the barn.

to listen. All went well until he was almost thru and the cow lifted her foot--the doctor said, "saw, Brownie". It wasn't long before she lifted her foot again and the doctor said "saw here". The third time Brownie gave a big kick and over went the milk. "Doc" got up, rubbed Brownie gently and said, "saw now honey" and then proceeded to finish milking the cow.

Mrs. Gore had told the doctor several times that he was not a good collector, and that they needed money to meet the expenses of the family. All the doctor would ever say was "All you can hold in your dead cold hand is what you have given away".

So many, many times the family had heard patients say when leaving, "See you Saturday, Doc!" One day the doctor's four year old grandson came after some medicine for his mother. As the youngster was leaving he said, "See you Saddey, Doc".

In July, 1948, the doctor became seriously ill, and was not able to visit patients. People continued to come see the doctor at his home until Mrs. Gore had to ask them not to because of the doctor's condition. In September, 1951, Dr. Gore was entered in the English Nursing Home, where he could be given the proper attention. He died November 4, 1951,

and was buried at the Mount Kenton Cemetery, Lone Oak. Inscribed on his monument are these words:

He didn't work for worldly gain
His treasure's are with God.
He worked with the weak and the lain,
What a beautiful path he trod.

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
