### Inoculation Of LOHS Students Held October 26

On October 26, 1953, two ladies in blue uniforms and white aprons paid a visit to our school. These ladies were Mary LaRue and Clara Dismukes from the County Health Department. They were here to give immunization shots to the students and teachers of our school. The types of shots given were typhoid vaccine and booster, triple antigen and booster, diphtheria toxoid, tetanus toxoid and booster, and smallpox vaccine.

The nurses have been assisted these past four weeks by Dr. J. A. O'Brian and Elizabeth Austen from the County Health Department; Mesdames Woodrow Barnard, Eugene Swain, Jessie Robertson, Paul Kelly, Cecil White-low, and Oalton Bagwell from the P. T. A.; Mrs. Kenneth Edwards also helped although she is not a member of the P. T. A. We and the nurses wish to thank these ladies for helping so much.

For the information of parents the typhoid shots are given three the first year and one booster each year after that. Triple antigen shots prevent whooping cough, diphtheria, and tetanus. Three of these shots should be given the first year and one booster every second year. These shots should not be given after the child is seven years old.

The diphtheria toxoid should be given in two doses four to six weeks apart. They should not be given after the child is ten years of age. The tetanus toxoid should also be given in two doses four to six weeks apart. One booster shot should be given yearly. The smallpox vaccine should be given every seven years. The child should see the nurse again after he takes the smallpox vaccine.

It is believed that at least 60 percent of the students took the shots.

### SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

The Science Department, headed by Mrs. Douglas, has a good start this year. The department has about \$50 worth of new equipment. They make good use of it in their studies. Science classes study the environment of plants and animals, how they live, and their life cycle. Each student makes and keeps a note book in which all of his observations and theories are placed. This visit would be enjoyable and profitable to every student.
