

THE NEW ENGLAND THANKSGIVING

The first New England Thanksgiving was celebrated during the second winter the Plymouth Colonisits spent in the New World. The first dreadful winter in Massachusetts had killed nearly half of the members of the colony, but new hope grew up in the summer of 1621. The corn harvest brought rejoicing. Governor William Bradford decreed that December 13, 1621 be set aside as a day of feasting and prayer to show the gratitude of the colonists that they were still

The women of the colonists spent many days preparing for the feast. Foods were boiled, baked and roasted. The children were kept busy turninig roasts on spits in front of open fires. More than eighty friendly Indians brought wild turkeys and venison. The tables were set out doors and all the people sat around them like one large family. Prayers, sermons and songs of praise were important
