### We Salute Henry Chambers

At the start of the present century there lived in Harris Grove, Kentucky a person who had every reason to make good. His name was Henry Chambers and he was the fifth and last child of a proud family. He was raised and attended grammar and high school in Calloway County. After high school days, he entered Western College at Bowling Green, Kentucky where he received his B. S. degree and his post graduate work at the University of Kentucky.

In 1930 he married Miss Basinbach of Russell, Ky. They have two sons and one daughter and a granddaughter, whom he has never seen. He lives and works just for two things—his business and his family.

He has been in school work for 27 years, starting his professional career at Almo, Kentucky, and has served McCracken County for 16 years, and the last eight as Superintendent.

In and for McCracken County, 99 classrooms are being constructed, five gymnasiums and auditorium combined, and repairing of old buildings, have amounted to \$2,900,000. Forty-six per cent of the money coming from the Federal Government, and 54% of it from State and local sources. In addition, 65 new teachers have been added to the school system.

This is only a part of the vast program which is being carried out, under his supervision.

From his past posts of service he has left an inheritance from which his neighbors and state are now deriving solid benefits. To him we salute.

#### SERVICES TO BE HELD IN NEW LONE OAK GYM

On October 15, McCracken County will be the scene of the greatest educational achievement in its history, and the greatest advancement of any county in Kentucky since 1951.

The day will begin with a giant motorcade consisting of school buses and as many automobiles as can be obtained to carry the throngs of people. A group will leave each school in the county and will merge at the new, modern Concord school, where they will be served a free lunch at 11:30 a.m. After lunch the motorcade will visit every school in the county for the purpose of viewing all the new and improved class rooms and gymnasiums.

The celebration will come to a close at Lone Oak for a free barbecue supper which will be served between 5:30 and 7:30. Following the supper the dedication will be made in the new Lone Oak gymnasium with 7,000 persons expected to attend.

The speakers for the dedication will be Governor Lawrence Weatherby, principal speaker; Dr. Ralph Woods, president of Murray State College; Wendell Butler, State Superintendent, and Roy Vance, prosecuting attorney of this district.

Other guests will include Henry Ward, head of the Department of Conservation; all McCracken County officials; all Paducah officials; Principals and Superintendents of the First and Second Districts; all College presidents; people from the United States Department of Education and the Murray State College Band and quartet who will furnish the music.

This will be the greatest day the McCracken County people have seen. Everyone is expected to attend the celebration and support the school leaders who have worked unceasingly for these new school additions.
