## FLASH ROMPS LOWES 87-46

Lowes, playing at home in their beautiful new gym, fell victim to a whirlwind second and third quarter attack by Lone Oak as the Flash trounced the outmanned Blue Devils 87-

After a ragged first quarter, fast break working to perfec-tion, outscored the Blue Devils 32-12 to take a commanding 43-20 lead. The Oakers continued to roll and increased their margin to 71-30 at the third quarter mark.

Five players scored in double numbers for the Flash, with Edwards paving the way by notching 21 points. Brilliant Johney Dawson gained 16 points

for Lowes.

## Tornado Edges Flash 55-53 In Overtime

In the best played game in the Purchase this season, the Flash fell before a strong Tilghman five 55-53 in an overtime, before the largest crowd ever to see a basketball game in Mc-Cracken County. More than 2,700 paid admissions.

The game was the first played between the two always strong rivals at Lone Oak since 1938. Since that time the two schools have played on the larger Tilghman floor, and split the pro-

With 4 minutes and 30 seconds gone in the initial cants the Tornado had jumped into a 7-2 lead, and the Flash didn't con-nect with a single field goal until 5 minutes and 30 seconds had elapsed, as a strong defense plus numerous early mistakes had caused few pops at the basket.

Tilghman escaped with a 13-12 first quarter lead, increased it to 33-23 at halftime, and led by 11 at the three quarter mark. In the final cants Edwards sparked a drive that seemed to generate the confidence, and drive that the Flash needed to pull within a 53-53 tie with 3 minutes and 40 seconds remaining. The Oakers grabbed the control of the ball with 3:25 remaining and elected to stall for a last second shot which Kinsey missed sending the game into an overtime.

With 12 seconds remaining in the overtime Griffith stole a pass at mid court, and drove for the deciding basket as the Flash missed five desperation shots in

the closing seconds.

Edwards and Colson led the Flash with 17, and 16 points respectively, with Austin and McNight tabing 16 and 14 respectively for the Tornado. Colson Luigs stod out on the hoards
