



FLASH OWN BEST RECORD IN FIELD

When the Second District Tournament opens March 1st at Lone Oak, the Flash will support the best record in the six team field.

Lone Oak will play Tilghman in the upper bracket on opening night, with most of the spotlight being centered on this clash.

As of February 16, Lone Oak owns an impressive 21-2 record, which ranks with the best in the state.

Coached by Don Stephenson, the Flash have a well balanced attack with Dee Edwards and Carroll Kinsey, the best pair of guards in the Purchase leading the scoring with 17 and 16 point averages respectively. The re-bound chores are shouldered by Colson, Freeman, Burnette and

Tilghman, coached by Otis Dinning, ranks high in the state ratings and owns the second best record in the tourney 13-4.

The Tornado own one of the taller teams in the area, and are sparked by Bobby Austin, a six-three all state candidate.

Heath and Ballard, who own identical 10-12 marks pair off in the lower bracket. The Pirates are sparked by six-eight center

Martin Holland. Holland owns a 23 plus scoring average, and is a great rebounder for coach Bill Carter.

The Ballard Bombers of coach Willard "Mutt" Carrol have only one veteran performer in Lee Molloy who sparks the attack.

St. Mary's was riddled by graduation, leaving Gene Kenny with only Pat Ward with varsity experience, causing a dismal 9-14 record for the Knights although Ward has been a

steady performer.

H. L. Paul had neither a gym, height, or experience to begin with at Reidland, but of late the Greyhounds have improved, and could cause trouble. The Greyhounds have won 7 of 19 encounters.

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M. O. Wrather Speaks To L. O. Students

On Wednesday, February 16, we had the pleasure of welcoming Mr. Marvin Wrather, head of the Extention Department and Assistant Predisent of Murray State College, as a visitor to Lone Oak. He made a wonderful speech, which, I am sure, everyone enjoyed. The main topic of his speech was "it may not be necessary for everyone to go to college, but everyone needs further training in some special field after high school." His speech began:

"You don't have to take anyone's advise. It.is your career, yor future."

"What you do after high school, what you make of yourself, is strictly up to you. No one can make your decisions for you, you have to make them yourself. A person who doesn't want to make his own decisions but wants someone to make them for him, won't last long. A young person should know where he wants to go and what he wants to do. It is his decision. The superintendent, Mr. Chambers, said in his speech last year that "the most important de cisions of your lives are made during your youth. You make your decision concerning religion and usually concerning life's companion. Think about these decisions, they stay with you as long as you live."

"Fifty-two per cent of the population of the United States is women. Over fifty per cent of all women who work are married. It is important that women be trained. Women can do so many things better than men. They are taking technician and engineering jobs rather than men everyday."

"Warehousing is one of the greatest fields there is today. In this day and age it even takes trained people to stack merchandise. Another important field is ministry. There is before you a great opportunity, one that has never faced America before. We cannot all do the same thing, study carefully your own field of business. Somewhere down the line you are going to be on your own. Your decisions will be your own. Make them good."
