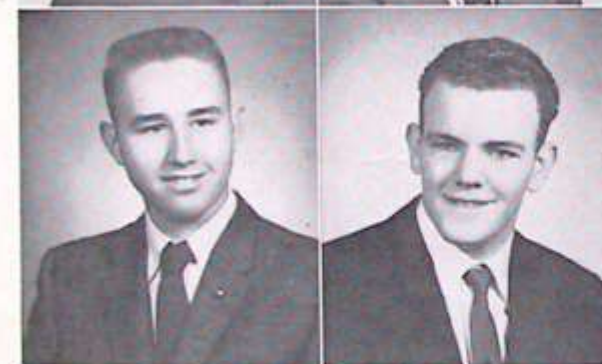

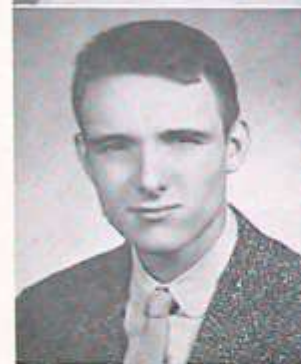

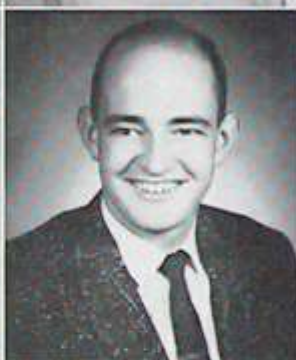

Class History

Can you remember—remember that very first day, September 3, 1954, when we, 112 "Green" Freshmen entered into the halls of dear old Lone Oak High? What kind of day was it? Was it raining or was the sun shining bright? It doesn't really matter except that it was the beginning of 112 young girls' and boys' high school education, which was one of the first steps in obtaining our position in the society.

To show that we were now capable of making decisions and old enough to fit into the adults' society, we choose as our leaders for 1954-55, Donnie Bouland, President; Bill O'Brien, Vice-President; and Pat Dowell, Secretary and Treasurer. Mrs. Euna Mae Hicks, our Freshman sponsor, made it easier for us to become adjusted into this new world by giving each of us individual attention.

Our class was well represented in all extra-curricular activities. Our extra-curricular activities included Music, Tri-Hi-Y, Hi-Y, F.H.A., F.F.A., Scouting, Chess, and especially Sports. Linda Bogard Watson, Linda Thomas Bolte and Nancy Kelly were B-Team Cheerleaders. Larry Harper and Terry Keeling played on the B-Team Basketball team. We were also represented on the Student Council by Nancy Kelly and Faye Mize.

By the time the year was completed, we felt we had gained a place for ourselves in Lone Oak High School.

As we entered our Sophomore year, we had 96 "Silly Sophomores" which really did live up to their titles. Donnie Bouland led our class as President, Jimmy Copland, Vice-President, Earl Adams, Secretary, and Pat Dowell, Treasurer. This year, our class sponsor was Mrs. James Shemwell.

This year, as before, we were well represented in extra-curricular activities. Six boys were on the B-Team Basketball team. One of our classmates, Nancy Kelly, gained her position as Varsity Cheerleader. Two of our classmates were F.H.A. officers. There were five in A Cappella, three on Student Council and two on the School Boy Patrol. Richard Johnson was assistant basketball manager. Four of our boys played baseball. This was Lone Oak's first year to have a school baseball team. We were also represented in Tri-Hi-Y, F.F.A., Scouting, and the Sportman's Beauty Contest.

Although it sounds as though all we have ever done is entered in extra-curricular activities, we know different. Just like any other class we had that one and only big problem—lessons. Yes, we fought through Shakespeare, struggled with crazy equations, and even tried to "crawl" out of writing short stories and reading books for book reports, just like everyone else did and like you will, too.

Between our lessons and extra-curricular activities, we didn't have much time left for anything else except for sleeping, eating and having a little bit more fun which we always made time for. Having fun, reminds us, especially us girls, about one day in our Health Class during our Sophomore year. It sure was funny seeing a man opening gifts at a baby shower. We believe Coach (Papa Don) Stephenson remembers it, too.

As we advanced to "Jolly Juniors" we again decreased in number. We now had 89 students who were still reaching for the stature. This was a very busy year. Our sponsors who led us through this year were Mrs. Zula Edwards, Mrs. Gwen Helfer, Mrs. Beverly Bell and Mrs. Zitell Goheen. One of our main tasks for the year was the Magazine Drive so we could entertain the Seniors with a banquet. Both were under the supervision of Mrs. Zitell Goheen. With the help of Mrs. Gwen Helfer and Mrs. Beverly Bell, we successfully presented our play, "The Headless Ghost". Donnie Bouland, Jerry Johnson, Pat Dowell and Joyce Ross were class officers.

Larry Harper, Terry Keeling, Gordon Kinsey, and Kenneth Edwards were on the Varsity Basketball Team and six boys were on the Baseball Team. Nancy Kelly was Varsity Cheerleader again, and Richard Johnson was Basketball Manager. We had four F.H.A. Chapter Officers and two District F.H.A. Officers, three Tri-Hi-Y Officers, and one F.F.A. Officer. We were also represented in the A Cappella Choir, Debate, Pep Club and the Sportman's Beauty Contest. Several of our classmates attended Girls' State and Boys' State.

After three years of keen anticipation with the help of our wonderful sponsors, teachers, friends and especially our parents, we have finally reached the stature which three years earlier few of us could ever believe we would reach . . . we were Seniors. Yes, we are SENIORS.

This year, our class was under the leadership of Don Bouland, President; Pat Dowell, Secretary; Joyce Ross, Treasurer; and Bill O'Brien, the only new officer this year, was Vice-President. Mrs. Mary North was our sponsor. She guided us through the high and cold waters of our last year of high school days. From her guidance and leadership, we have had a wonderful and overflowing year of activities and success.

We chose "Not Finished, Just Begun" for our class motto. Our choice for a class flower was the carnation and for our class colors we chose red and white.

This year, like the rest, the Seniors actively participated in all school activities. Barbara Boss, Pat Dowell, Betty Brookshire, Norma Clark and Judy Yates were officers in Tri-Hi-Y, and Earl Adams was an officer in Hi-Y. Several of our Seniors attended the Kentucky Y.M.C.A. Youth Assembly at Frankfort this year, too. Joe Ann Adams, Frances Smith, Charlotte Lamar and Pat Dowell were Chapter F.H.A. Officers. Joe Ann Adams and Nancy Kelly were District F.H.A. Officers. In F.F.A., Richard Johnson was Chapter President.

Under the leadership of the Senior girls, the Pep Club was continued for the second consecutive year. Nancy Kelly was a Varsity Cheerleader. Larry Harper, Kenneth Edwards, Mike Smithson, Gordon Kinsey and Kenneth Weatherspoon were members of the Varsity Basketball Team, which won the 2nd District Tournament. This was the first time in twelve years for Lone Oak to win the District Tournament. Larry Harper, Terry Keeling, Don Bouland, Gerald Wyatt, Dalmos Joyce, Jerry Hook and Mike Smithson were on the Baseball team.

Janet Taylor, Barbara Boss, Bud Reeves, Judy Yates, Carolyn McNeil, Nancy Smith and Jerry Purvis represented our class on the Debate Team and in Speech.

Our Journalism Class published the Oak "K" and the Senior Spotlight with Pat Dowell serving as Editor. This year, the Oak "K" was larger than any other school paper that the Lone Oak Journalism Class has ever published before.

For our Senior play, "The Trail of the Lonesome Pine" was chosen. Mrs. North, our Sponsor, directed the play which was presented on May 9.

Our class was also represented in the Music Department and its activities. There were five Seniors in the A Cappella Choir.

During our high school days, some of us have received honors we could never forget. Don Bouland received a medal in Science, Janet Taylor won a Superior at the Regional Speech Festival, Joe Ann Adams and Pat Dowell received their State F.H.A. Homemakers' Degree, the highest honor to hold in F.H.A., Frances Smith, Joanne Wyatt, Betty Brookshire, Patsy Phelps and Pat Dowell passed all three of the NOMA Spelling Tests, Frances Smith was third in the NOMA Spelling Contest, Don Bouland, Betty Brookshire and Barbara Boss were selected for the Paducah Sun-Democrat's Salute To Youth, Joe Ann Adams was one of the "Top Ten Girls" at the State F.H.A.
