A full-blooded Arapaho, with the white-man name of Sheridan Mills and wearing the garb of an ordained clergyman, is about to meet his mother, whom he has not seen since childhood. After a Shoshone raid in which his father had been killed, she had left him with a troop of Cavalry while she rode across the plains for help. But she never returned.

When he is older he finds the man who killed his father. He doesn't know if he should kill him or not, because he is in love with a well-to-do young white girl. It is not an easy battle but he begins to see the Indian as an individual.

With dignity and perception, the author reveals the human depth of the red man and weaves an exciting story of dedication, struggle, and spiritual achievement which the reader will not soon forget.

We are looking forward to a very successful season.

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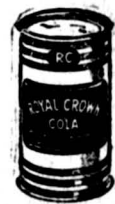
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THE SNOOPER
