Christmas Today

The present-day American Christmas is the heir of Christmas in many lands and in many ages, for Colonists from England and Holland, from Germany and Sweden, from Spain and France and Italy, have all contributed to Christmas. Above all, it is a day of family celebration and a special day for the children

On Christmas Eve children hang up their stockings and while they sleep Santa Claus fills each stocking with toys, oranges, nuts and candy. After the exchange of gifts the family may go to Church. The Christmas dinner is almost certain to include turkey and cranberry sauce, and pumpkin pie or plum pudding.

Schools hum with preparation for the play or pageant or festival which is produced for parents and friends just before the holidays. In many schools children bring their old toys and books and spend hours cleaning and mending them for less fortunate children.

Churches have special music and beautiful decorations. Many have midnight services on Christmas Eve.

The American Christmas especially remembers the poor. Every community takes the responsibility for seeing that some joy or comfort is brought to its less fortunate members. Churches, schools and charitable organizations collect food and clothing for the unfortunate.

In our modern Christmas celebration, the radio and TV play an important part, helping to bring the whole world together. We, in America, can listen to famous choirs in Europe, singing the songs of Christmas in their own language. Songs sung at the very birthplace of Jesus reaches the whole world at once, in broadcasts from Palestine.

On Christmas Eve in the little town of Bethlehem, a long procession winds through the narrow streets. At its head march church dignitaries, priests, and acolytes, their gorgeous vestments gleaming in the light of their candles. They carry a tiny gilded wicker cradle in which lies a lovely wax image representing the Infant Jesus.

At the old, fortress-like Church of the Nativity they pause as each worshiper stops to enter the low doorway. The ceremony closes when reverent hands lay the image of the Christ Child in the underground Grotto of the Nativity.

In Mexico, the people start celebrating on December 16 and end on Christmas Eve. The children receive their gifts on January 6.

In Brazil and Argentina the people hold carnivals in the streets, with music of guitars and clicks of the castanets.

In Italy and Spain, Christmas is more of a Church festival than it is in northern Europe. The devout observe a one-day fast beginning at sunset of December 23. Preparations and ceremonies start several weeks before the holy season, which begins at sunset on December 24 and lasts until Epiphany. Nearly every
