LONE OAK LOSES TO CARLISLE

The Lone Oak Purple Flash lost to Carlisle County on December 16 by a score of 81 to 68. The Lone Oak Flash fought hard all the way but caught a lot of bad breaks.

The score by quarters: First quarter, 9 to 14; second quarter, 36 to 24; third quarter, 61 to 57; and the final score 81 to 68. The leading scorer for Lone Oak was Larry Powers with 22 points; Tapscott, 16; Clark, 14; Brown, 9; Davis, 7.

Who's Who In Points

The Lone Oak Flash is not doing as well as we were hoping it would, but is now making some progress, although in the first seven games the Flash scored 379 points for an average of 54 points a game.

Ozzie Tapscott leads with 93 points, Clark has 90 points for second place, Brown third with 70 points, Powers fourth with 59 points, Owens fifth with 30 points, Davis sixth with 18 points, Rushing seventh with 16 points and Page has 3 points.

We feel sure that the Flash will end with a good season.
