Let's Wake Up To Education

The facts indicate that it is not so much the public that needs to be awakened to a better education for our pupils but the educators themselves need to wake up.

When a Russian graduates from high school he has had five years of physics, four years of chemistry, one year of astronomy, five years of biology, ten years of mathematics and trigonometry, and five years of a foreign language.

A survey was taken of American high school graduates and found, fewer than one-third take a year in chemistry, only one-fourth study physics, one-seventh of these take advanced mathematics and we are extremely far behind in foreign languages.

This survey proved Russian pupils learn more in ten years than we do in twelve.
