Flash Rolls Past Livingston In Big Season Opener

In the Lone Oak basketball debut at Livingston Central on Tuesday, November 10 the strong Purple Flash lived up to the predictions by sweeping past a stunned Cardinal team.

The Lone Oak team started showing its power in the first few minutes of the opener. Livingston had a 5-4 lead after about a minute and a half of play. The Purple Flash started edging the margin gradually after only two minutes of play and ended the first period with a slim 15-10 score. In the second quarter the Flash started to click and ended the period with a score of 37-21. This was just the beginning of the strength the Flash was to prove it had.

Lone Oak widened the margin in the third quarter and ended it by 51-32.

The Flash started out in the fourth period with a series of fast breaks which tore the bottom out of the Cardinal defense and finished the game with the victorious score of 77-39.

Brown claimed game honors by scoring 37 points which is, if not the school record is very close to it. Clark played a good second by scoring 22 points. Lone Oak finished the game with a 50 per cent shooting average and a 72 per cent free throw average. Other players who were a great help in the premiere game were Gilbert with 6 points, Owens 4, Powers who made a great show in rebound power scored 2 points. McIntosh made 2, Davis scored 2 and Huff also made 2 points.

The Lone Oak "B" team won its first ball game by 38-33. The Flash showed in its first game by winning a harem scare game. The half-time margin was 20-16. Lone Oak held a close margin all the way to the end.

Phelps took Lone Oak honors with 14 points. Overton had 9; Alexander, 7; Johnson, 6; and Dallas had 2.
