Jessalyn Sue was born February 3, 1960, at the Western Baptist Hospital. She weighed 7 lbs. and was 19 inches long.


Mr. Hall is one of the fine young men teachers at Lone Oak High School this year. He teaches junior English and Speech.

We at Lone Oak welcome you Miss Edwards!


FASHIONS By Sheron James

Good News About

We've just heard of a wonderful project which is being financed by those coins we've been putting into March of Dimes containers. And, best of all, this project can help students in our school.

It's The National Foundation's Health Scholarship program, aimed at increasing the number of workers in the health professions-doctors, nurses, physical therapists, occupational therapists and medical social workers. This program offers anywhere from 5 to 25 scholarships per state-each of them totaling \$2,000 over a four-year period-to qualified high school and college students in each of the 50 states.

Interested seniors should check at once, because the deadline for filing application blanks is April 1. High school seniors are immediately eligible for scholarships in nursing, physical therapy and occupational therapy.

This National Foundation Health Scholarship program also brings good news to all freshmen, sophomores and juniors who would like to go into these professions, but who have hesitated about planning for college because of the lack of funds. We think it's a good idea to find out the scholastic requirements in the profession of your choice, and concentrate on meeting these requirements. Chances are, if you're really serious about entering, and if your grades are good, you'll be able to find financial help-even though you may not be eligible for a Health Scholarship.

Increasing the number of qualified workers in the health fields is a project vital to the future wellbeing of our country. As Basil O'Connor, President of The National Foundation, has said: "Out of the classrooms of today will come the Jonas Salks of tomorrow."

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

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Regular Season Totals By Carrell Childress


THE OAK "K"

This year 1959-'60 the Lone Oak High School Varsity Basketball Team has come out of the regular season and Christmas Tournament games with a 20 win and 7 loss record.

With a 20-7 record the team has made a total of 1,632 points with their oppositions making a total of 1,336 points. Lone Oak has an average of 60.6 points per game or a total of 286 points more than their opposition who have an average of 49.5 points per game.




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LONE OAK ELEMENTARY OWNS UNBEATEN RECORD
