Southern Assembly Program

On October 11, Lone Oak was host to a Southern Assembly program starring Burton Lynn Jackson, musical entertainer.

Mr. Jackson in many years of public appearances compiled an impressive record of over 2000 performances as an unaccompanied marimba soloist. Later he toured Europe as a member of the 100-piece International Marimba Orchestra, and appeared at Carnegie Hall in New York. His educational background is equally impressive. He holds two bachelor's degrees from Northwestern University — in marimba and in music education — and a master's degree from the University of Michigan.

The program included delightful choices of melodious selections in the field of classical, semi-classical and popular music from the works of Mozart, Beethoven, Chopin, Rosini, Kabalevsky, Prokofieff, Tschai-kowsky, and from American composers, David Guoin, David Rose and "Music Man" Meredith Wilson.

The students quickly recognized the melodies, some of which were and are themes from well known TV and radio programs. Just as quickly they recognized the high degree of artistry demonstrated by an outstanding musician and performer in Burton Jackson.

MOCK ELECTION HELD OCTOBER 26TH

A mock election was held on Wednesday, October 26th, at Paducah Junior College at which time the students expressed their opinion on the various issues to be decided at the polls on November 8.

Mr. Charles Katterjohn acted as Master of Ceremonies and gave the opening address. He said, "When you vote in an election you show that you are acquainted with the issues of the campaign."

Students of PJC voiced their different views of the issues and then gave the most important points for both Democratic and Republican parties.

The issues presented were:

(1) **Limited Constitutional Convention** given by David Brewer.

His speech can best be summed up by quoting Cassius M. Clay, president of the 1890 Constitutional Convention (Delegate from Bourbon County), who said, "Times change and we change . . . we must adjust our laws to the present . . . not the PAST."

(2) **Road Bond Issue** given by Wanda Stewart. She pointed out that by passing this bill we would not be raising the taxes.

(3) **TVA Power** given by Danny Sills. Mr. Sills stated that by the old law passed by the Convention that no duplication of power could be had by any city. This was why we could not have both TVA and KU.

(4) Tom Inman spoke in behalf of **KU** by telling of the services that were offered by them. He advocated that to vote for TVA would be a vote for city ownership.

After these views had been presented, campaign speeches for the two Presidential and Vice Presidential candidates, and for the office of State Senator were heard.

Mrs. Jessie Dortch spoke for Republican **John Sherman Cooper** for Senator. Although a Democrat originally, Mrs. Dortch will vote for Cooper, because he is for the people of Kentucky. After being defeated by Vice President Nixon for that office, President Eisenhower appointed him as ambassador to India. Mr. Charles "Chuck" Codwell was interrupted by loud cheers as he told the qualifications which **Keen Johnson** had, such as serving as Governor of Kentucky from 1939-1943.

Then came the most important speeches of the day. Barbara Wilson, Republican Student Chairman, introduced the speakers who were to give three of the platforms of the Republican party.

The first was Dale Bremer, who spoke on the "Farm Issue."

Second, was Jim Benson following him with "The Economic Growth of the Country."

Last was Kenneth Wildes, who covered the religious issue. He said, "Although Mr. Nixon has tried to stop religion being discussed in politics, Mr. Kenedy and his aids had insisted on bringing it into the election."

The Democrats then came to the stand in rebuttal with Bob "Cotton" Etheridge introducing the ones to speak in behalf of the Democratic party.

Number one was Len Roach, who spoke on the "Home Policy." He mentioned that Mr. Kennedy, a graduate of Harvard, had had 21 honorary degrees conferred upon him.

Carolyn Schmidt, 1960 Lone Oak graduate, entitled her speech, "Foreign Policy." Miss Schmidt stated that Mr. Kennedy wanted a more extensive student exchange program. She felt that Kennedy was qualified to voice his opinion on this subject since he graduated with a Bachelor of Science and International Relations, and had spent 14 years in Congress.

Carol Tyler presented some interesting facts concerning (1) Federal aid to education (2) Civil rights (3) Minimum wage (4) Housing.

Her speech was entitled "International Problems."

Mike Sticher, the last speaker for the day, spoke on "Should a Catholic be Elected to the Presidency of the United States?" His answer is one that we should all remember. It was, "Both candidates worship the same God."

With this statement the program was turned back over to Mr. Katterjohn.

Mr. A. J. Houser, County Court Clerk, came forward at this time to present a demonstration on how to operate the voting machines.

ROVING REPORTER

The question asked this month was: Should the Subject of Politics enter into a Classroom Discussion?

Here are some of the various opinions:

Miss Stewart: To the extent of party platforms.

Mrs. Helfer: Yes. Probably the best place would be in a civics or history class, but any unbiased, non-partisan discussion would help young people form opinions of their own.

Mr. Douglas: Yes, it is all right for politics to be discussed in the classroom. Students need to form opinions about current political problems. The teacher may desire to refrain from taking sides with opinions given, but he has a right under academic freedom to express his views, just so long as he does not try to convince someone that his opinions are the correct ones.

Donna Jeanne Yates: No. I don't think it should be discussed in the classroom because if students want to be informed on politics they can obtain it from their own local paper or magazine such as Time or Newsweek. I think a teacher may get over-involved and voice his or her opinion and try to influence the student.

Clarinda Krinard: Yes, I think a discussion of politics is good for any student. However, discussions should take place in the proper class for such subjects. In a few years these same students will be voting and they will have to know the needed character of the future leaders of our country.

Jack Osborne: No, I do not think that politics should be discussed in class any more than religion should because it can cause too much conflict between teacher and student and among the students themselves.
