Teacher Of The Month

Mr. and Mrs. Sig Johnson, of Wingo, Ky. are the parents of our assistant coach, Henry Sig Johnson, the teacher the Oak "K" staff would like to honor this month.

Mr. Johnson and his wife are the parents of three children, Norman Dale, 6; Joe Keith, 5; and Donald Jan, aged 3. They have bought their own home at 2860 Maryland Avenue in Lone Oak.

For the students who do not know Mr. Johnson, we have this description of him. He is 6' 2" tall, weighs 175 lbs., has blue eyes and brown hair. He does not smoke, and he hunts rabbits for a sport. He is a member of the Southside Baptist Church.

Mr. Johnson first began teaching at the age of 20 (which makes him 31) at Dublin, Ky., in the seventh and eighth grades, and coached for two years.

From 1953-'55 he served two years in the Army Signal Corps. Eight months of this time was spent at Ft. Knox, and the remaining 16 months he was stationed at Seventh Army Headquarters at Stuttgart, Germany.

In 1955 Mr. Johnson began teaching school in Carlisle County, and teaching and coaching in the High School until 1957.

Before going into the Armed Forces, Mr. Johnson had been attending college, and in the fall of 1957 he went back to Murray State to finish his college education. In January of 1960 he graduated from college with a BS Degree in Business Education, Health and Physical Education, and with half of his Master's Degree in Education.

For one semester of this year he taught at Forrestdale Elementary School. Now, this fall, Mr. Johnson began coaching the eighth, ninth, and the second string of the high school basketball team, along with assisting with the first team.

We would like to take this opportunity to welcome Mr. Johnson to the teaching staff of Lone Oak High School, and we hope that he is able to continue teaching and coaching for many years to come. We are proud to have teachers who have worked their way through college by farming, digging wells, and any other way to earn "an honest dollar" at Lone Oak.

Mr. Johnson said, "I believe Lone Oak is one of the outstanding high schools. Here the students respect the teachers very highly."

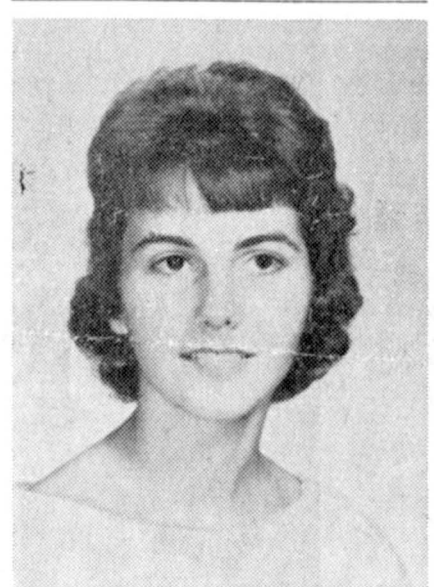

The Principal's Viewpoint . . .

WHY DO WE TEACH?

I have heard so many people say "I would not have your job for anything in the world." To me this is a statement that I cannot understand anyone making. I have the most pleasant job of any person in the world.

There is not but one reason for teaching, or having school, and that is the **child**. I am just one of the many that is teaching school, but I can honestly say that each morning I look forward to seeing the children again that day. Children are important. You may work at the Atomic Bomb Plant, or you may be a builder of houses, you may be a salesman or farmer; but you do not deal in a commodity as great and good and sweet as our children.

Being a teacher I have always said that the greatest sin I could commit would be to fail to teach a child something every day. I also believe that we should teach the child to be a better citizen, to live in a confused, complicated world.

Since Sputnik was put into orbit, there has been a lot of talk about our schools. I will be the first to admit that we are weak in several departments, but we still have better schools than you will find in other countries. A great amount has been said about science and mathematics. These courses are important but why leave off something else to get these. A good student should be well rounded in all fields. We are trying hard to start a band; we have placed in our curriculum advanced courses in English and Science; this year we began to offer Industrial Arts. At the present time we offer forty-six different units of credit; our program will soon be to the point that any child can take what he needs.

I know teachers have not always been paid the highest salary. I know at times people have thought teachers were not at their standard in life. I have always thought that there is greater remuneration to teaching than money; but since teachers are getting more money I think they should strive hard to do something better for the child everyday. I will always believe that people want better schools and are willing to pay for better schools, but in turn they want the school people to do all they can to improve schools. I agree with this. I wish that I could impress on every teacher and parent the importance of the child and to get all of them to say

"I love children."
