NOMA Contests

The National Office Management Association sponsored their annual spelling test at Lone Oak on November 17, 1960. Out of this number three seniors, Brenda Smith, Ginger Bean, and Loree Faith, made 100% on the spelling test.

There will be another spelling test covering another one hundred words before a student from Lone Oak will be eligible to enter the regional contest. One of the three, or all three of the above named students will be taking a trip to the regional if they make a perfect score on the second test.

Another contest open to high school students is a new math contest also sponsored by the National Office Management Association. Only four people were able to make a passing grade on the math test. They were: Ginger Bean, Phyllis Goodwin, Donna Parker, and Shirley Rudolph.

These contests are given to the high school student for the future advantage of the business man. Incidentally, a "shaganappi" is a piece of thread.

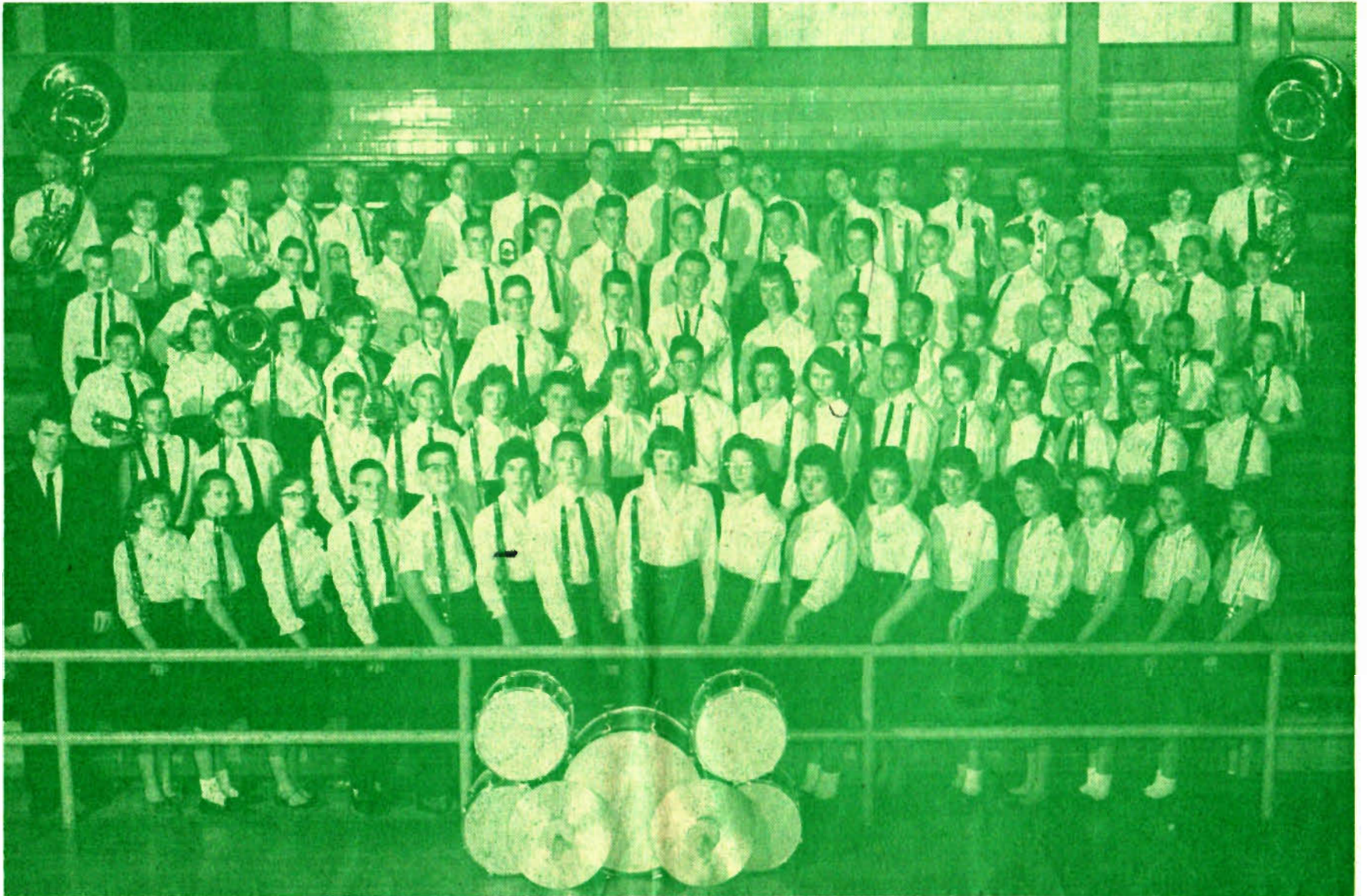
Martin Wins Contest
