The Southern Assembly Programs have provided Lone Oak with entertainment before, but none can quite compare with Dr. Herman Melville, who visited us on February 9, 1961, to present a program on glass blowing.

Although 50% of the students who attend these programs merely do so to get out of class, and another 25% to see something spectacular, to have seen the rapt attention on the faces of the students during this program, you would have thought these statistics to be all wrong.

Dr. Melville said that he was not here to entertain but to enlighten us on the facts of glass, and that this was not to be a stereotype program.

Dr. Melville attended school in Europe and has worked with glass all of his life, and yet he says that he still knows very little about it, and that to him glass has a very romantic background.

He left all of his works that he made during the program with the school. They are on display in the showcase, in the lobby.

First, Dr. Melville created a small boat, and while he was making this, he told a story of how glass was discovered. He used no special type of glass, except that it was leaded in order to put a luster in the work.

When he had finished the first creation, Dr. Melville began to blow a replica of the first specimen of glass that was ever known.

He showed how glass could be made into a thread 1/1000 of an inch in diameter.

Let us take Dr. Melville's advice that he offered at the end of the program when he said, "Education is one of the most important things in the life of anyone," and make the most of our school days.

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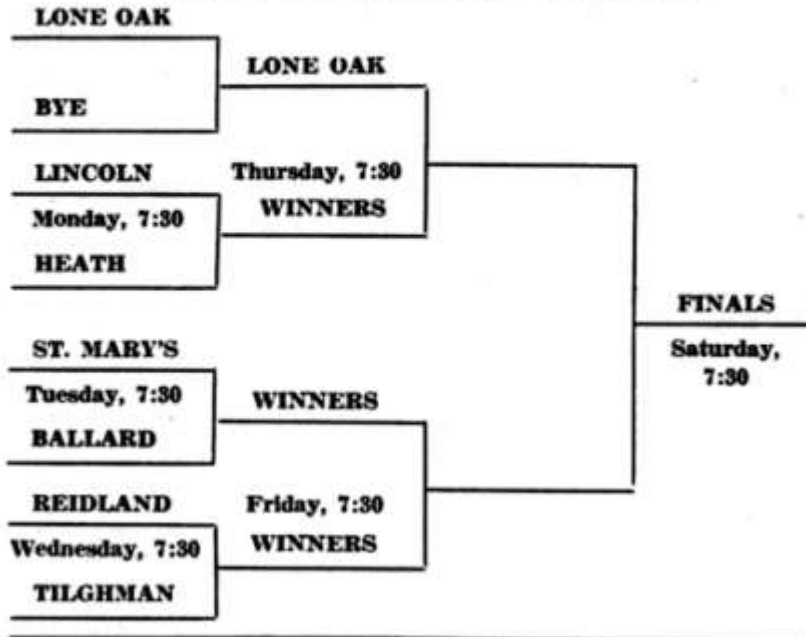

The accountants, for instance, made a salary from \$350 to \$1,500 a month, according to their qualifications, of course. He mentioned that students were not wasting their time taking business subjects, because the fields are open and they offer many attractive features.

Some of the fields that have a good out-look to the future are credit sales managers, purchasing

agents and key punch operators. This is a time of automation where skilled operators are needed. The old principles are still involved, but the use of the machine helps business move more rapidly.

The retail field in particular has expanded rapidly also, and the servicing of the large number of accounts requires a great many of credit employees. In the majority of retail businesses there are good jobs in the credit department. The salaries of the Credit Managers vary widely depending upon the size of the concern for which they work. They usually range from \$75 to \$175 a week.
