NFL Brings Home Honors

Ballarmine College, Louisville, was host to the National Forensic League Preliminary Congress, September 23.

Nine Lone Oak students and Mrs. McCracken made the trip to Louisville.

Gregory Weitzel was elected the best speaker in the Senate and was awarded the medal. He also received the gavel at the official state Congress in Frankfort last year for having been elected Speaker of the House. Gregory was elected speaker at every student congress held in Kentucky last year. Carolyn Douglas presided over House II. She has also won trophies for her previous portrayals of Anne Frank.

Lone Oak students who were seated included: Mr. Weitzel, Cathy Allison, and Ellyn Dallas, senators; Miss Douglas, Lynn Boyd, Lesley Lisso, Pam Smith, Joe Henderson, and Don Liles, representatives. These students earned more N.F.L. credit points at this tri-cameral session than those from any other school.

The next Preliminary Congress will convene at Clark County High School, Winchester, November 4.

Mrs. McCracken, Chairman of the N.F.L. in Kentucky, was in charge of the Congress.

No player managed to get more than one hit off Shelton, who held the Greyhounds in check all the way in pitching his four-hit shut-out. Lone Oak banged out eight hits, exactly twice the number Reidland collected.

LONE OAK TOPS HEATH IN 5-4 THRILLER

Lone Oak was in sole possession of first place in the Big Six Fall Baseball League on September 19, after topping the Heath Pirates 5-4 at Lone Oak Park. This victory gave the Purple Flash an unblemished record of five wins and no losses at the halfway mark of the season.

The Oakers coupled fine relief pitching with timely hitting in gaining the hard-earned victory. Lone Oak was led at the plate by short-

stop Jay Burnette who had a perfect day with a double and two singles. Terry Maynard chipped in with a double and single to aid the Oakers winning cause.



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Lone Oak Downs Lyon Co.

Lone Oak remained undefeated in the Big Six Fall High School Baseball League by trouncing Lyon County 13 to 1 at the Lone Oak diamond on September 12. It was Lone Oak's third consecutive win without a loss. Mike Austin, second baseman for the Purple Flash, led the team at bat with four hits in five trips to the plate, while Larry Jarvis the leftfielder for Lone Oak, collected three hits in four times at bat. Charles Brown, fast-balling right-hander for the Flash, allowed only four hits and one run in picking up the easy victory.

Flash Edges No. Marshall

Lone Oak ran its record to 4-0 in the Big Six Fall Baseball League on September 14, by edging past the North Marshall Jets 5-4, at Lone Oak Park. The Flash leading 5-0, going into the final frame nearly booted its game away as North Marshall scored four runs, two of which were unearned as the Flash committed two costly errors.

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
