Other first place winners were: Tyree Harris, Madison, Tennessee, Boys' Extemporaneous speaking; Dian Quinn, Paris, Tennessee, Original Oratory, and Charlotte Owens, Paris, Tennessee, Dramatic Interpretation. Placing in other events were Carolyn Douglas with a second place trophy in Dramatics and Lynn Boyd with a third in Poetry reading.

Lone Oak went into the 1960 Paducah Tilghman Invitational Tournament with a 3 won and 5 lost record, the only losing record in the tournament and emerged with a 6 won and 5 lost record plus the biggest of all rewards, the huge championship trophy. This was the first Christmas tournament Lone Oak had ever won. They came close in 1959 only to have Carlisle County edge them in the finals. The Flash was considered a team with only mediocre chance of even reaching the semi-finals. The Oakers, taking this prediction as an insult, decided to show Jim Elkins, Paducah Sun-Democrat Sports Editor, and everyone else in this area what they could do if they just set their minds to it. The determined Oakers used an airtight defense and a potent offense to walk off with the big trophy. The enthusiasm of the Lone Oak crowd had a great deal to do with the Flash winning. I have never seen or heard a crowd yell harder and with more pep and vigor than they did last year. The Oakers carry a 4 won and 5 lost record into the annual Yule event this year and with the hustle and desire that they have shown in the last few games they stand an excellent chance of winning the tournament again. The Flash takes on a powerful Livingston Central quintet who had to come from behind with a red hot second half to defeat Lone Oak 73-52 in both teams' season opener. Many of the Lone Oak players have expressed their desire to get a chance for revenge at the Cardinals.

Every year about this time, colored lights glint behind frosty windowpanes, snow begins to fall, and Christmas is just around the corner.

In a few more days we will be celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ, whose mission was to proclaim that "God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him shall not perish, but have everlasting life."

Christ was a young man who was born in an obscure village, the child of a peasant woman. He grew up in another village, and worked in a carpenter shop until he was thirty, then for three years he was an itinerant preacher. Christ never held an office nor did he own a home or have a family. He never had an opportunity to go to college. He never traveled as far as two-hundred miles from the place where he was born. Christ never did one of the things that usually accompany greatness.

While he was a young man, the tide of public opinion turned against Him. His friends left him and He was turned over to his enemies. He went through the mockery of a trial and was nailed to a cross between two thieves. While He was dying, his executioners gambled for the only piece of property he had on earth, and that was his coat. When He was dead, He was laid in a borrowed tomb through pity of a friend.

Nineteen centuries have come and

gone, and today He is to be the central figure of the human race and leader of the column of progress. However, just as it was when the baby Jesus was to be born, there was no room for Him in the inn, some people do not have room for Him in their lives today.

Christmas through the eyes of a child, is the time of wonder and magic, starshine and tinsel—but more than that, it is a time of closeness only a child may feel for the Babe in a Manger. If Christmas is too commercial, adults made it so; for children do not think of it in that way.

If we take the time to seek and find the inside of Christmas, the Christmas spirit will glow with a new radiance within our hearts. We should pray that strength and courage be given to all who work for a good reason and understanding, that the good which lies in man's heart may day by day be magnified, that men may come to a clearer knowledge of that which unites them, rather than that which divides them, that each hour may bring us closer to a final victory, not of nation over nation but of man over his evils and weakness, that the real atmosphere of the Christmas Season—its joy, its beauty, its hope, and above all its abiding faith—may live among us, and may the peace to build and grow, to live in harmony and sympathy with others, and to plan for the future with confidence, be ours.

The Benton Indians used an air tight defense plus a highly effective shuffle offense to defeat the Lone Oak Purple Flash 53-49 at the Benton gymnasium on December 1. The Flash and the Indians hooked up in a nip and tuck battle which saw no more than six points separating the two teams at any one time. Benton led 13-11 at the first period, but the Flash spurred in the second quarter for a slim 24-23 halftime lead. The Indians forged back on top 38-36 at the end of the third period and upped the margin by two points in the final canto. Rusty Anderson led the Indians attack with 17 points. Billy Hopwood led Lone Oak with 19 points while David Shelton chipped in with 15. No other Lone Oak player managed to hit in double figures.

Ballard Nips Lone Oak

The Ballard Memorial Bombers used a foul shot by guard, Bob Berry in the waning seconds of the ballgame to defeat the Lone Oak Purple Flash 57-56 at Lone Oak on November 17. Lone Oak managed a 14-13 first period lead and a narrow 33-31 halftime margin before the determined Bombers overtook them 48-44 at the end of the third period. Freddie Tanner led the Bombers' attack with 20 points. Ron Alexander had 13 points for Lone Oak's top effort while Charles Brown added 11.

North Marshall Downs Lone Oak

The North Marshall Jets used the red hot shooting of Paul Darnall in downing Lone Oak 77-72 in a hard fought game at the North Marshall gymnasium on December 5. The Jets zoomed off to a 21-15 first period lead only to see the fired-up Oakers forge into a 3 point 37-34 halftime lead. The Jets regained the lead at 59-56 at the end of three quarters and upped the gap to five in the last canto. The 5-9 Darnall popped in 29 points to lead a well balanced North scoring attack which saw three men hitting in the double figures. Ron Alexander led the Oaker's scoring attack with 22 points followed closely by Charles Brown with 19 and David Shelton with 17.

Even though losing the Flash gained much added respect and prestige by battling the Jets down to the final horn. This was by far the Oaker's best performance of the young season. The tough luck Oakers have lost three of their five games by a combined total of ten points.
