



LONE OAK FANS WITNESS UNBELIEVABLE

The fans who attended the Lone Oak - South Marshall 'B' team game on January 8, 1962, at Lone Oak witnessed an unbelievable event. Lone Oak's future stars held the South Marshall 'B' team scoreless for an entire half and took a whopping 27-0 lead to the dressing room at halftime. The Flash finished with a 48-24 victory running their season's record to a very impressive 7 won and 2 lost. South Marshall finally broke the scoring ice early in the third period and finished with 24 points for the game, actually outscoring the Oaker's 24-21 the second half as assistant coach Sig Johnson substituted freely. The Oaker's were actually using a revamped line-up due to the illness of regulars, Ken Grief and Freddie Howard. The five boys who turned in this defensive gem of the century were as follows: Jay Burnett, Roy Rushing, Jim Hicks, John Beaton, and Hank Shepherd.

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Lone Oak Upsets Heath

The Lone Oak Purple Flash ran their season's record to 5-7 on January 8 with a stunning 51-50 upset over the Heath Pirates. The Flash coupled a tremendous man-to-man defense, plus a 15 point night at the foul line, to over-shadow a fivefield-goal deficit in recording their biggest victory of the season. The Flash held a slim four-point lead, 10-6, at the end of the first quarter and maintained that same four-point margin 27-23 as the two teams trooped to the half-time dressing rooms. The determined Oakers upped their gap to 38-33 at the end of three quarters and held off a gallant come-back effort on the part of the Pirates to hand them their fifth loss of the season, 51-50. With Lone Oak leading 50-48 and five seconds remaining to play David Shelton sank a foul shot to put the icing on the cake.

After Shelton had hit his foul shot for the Flash they dropped back on defense and allowed Heath to score unmolested. Wayne Rice pumped in a fielder just as the final horn sounded to account for the final score. This victory was especially sweet for both the Lone Oak players and Mr. Robinson, as their dear friend, Don Stephenson, ex-Lone Oak mentor, is now principal at Heath. Don Alexander led the Lone Oak attack with 19 points and turned in a stand-out job on the boards while scrappy Billy Hopwood added 13. Dale Warford and David Holland paced the Bucs' losing cause with 12 points each.

Lone Oak Rolls Past South Marshall

The Lone Oak Purple Flash used a red hot second half in rolling past South Marshall 73-41, on January 5, 1962. The Oakers' held a meager four-point lead, 11-7 at the end of the first canto and managed a 27-21 half-time lead. School was out for the Rebels after the first half as the fast-breaking Flash roared into a commanding 51-31 third-period lead. The Flash continued to look impressive in the fourth stanza as they ran their final margin of victory to 32 points at 73-41. Ron Alexander led the balanced Lone Oak scoring attack with 19 points, David Shelton netted 15, while Billy Hopwood and Charlie Brown added 14 and 13 points respectively. Mike Miller paced the losing Rebels with 14 points.

Livingston Spoils Lone Oak's Hopes

The Livingston Central Cardinals used their overwhelming heighth advantage to control both offensive and defensive backboards en route to downing Lone Oak 71-59 in the annual Paducah Tilghman Christmas Tournament on December 26. thus spoiling Lone Oak's hopes of repeating as Christmas Tournament Champions. The Flash led by three points late in the first period before David Boswell hit two fieldcrs to put the Cardinals in front to stay. Livingston led 17-12 at the end of the initial period and held a 34-25 half-time lead. The Cards were ahead by 15 points, 46-31 when Lone Oak started pressing and cut the deficit to eight, 50-42 at the end of the third quarter. Lone Oak got another two points at the start of the final period to cut the gap to six, but then the Flash lost both guards, David Shelton and Billy Hopwood, and forward Ron Alexander via the foul route. School was out for the Flash from here on out as the Cards slowly pulled away. Tommie Ramage led the Cardinals with 23 points, followed closely by David Boswell with 21 and Wayne Henson with 18. David Shelton paced the Oaker's losing cause with 17 points. Pat Hawley netted 13 while Charlie Brown added 12.

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
