STUDENTS ATTEND YOUTH ASSEMBLY

On the morning of March 28, 1962, Carol DeVillez, Diana Blackburn, Teresa Schmidt, June Burks, and Judy Matlock left to represent the Lone Oak Tri-Hi-Y Club at Youth Assembly in Frankfort. About noon of the same day John Bouland of the Hi-Y Club left to resume his position as Commissioner of Highways on the Governor's Cabinet. Each of the girls had her own special job also. Carol acted as district 3A's campaign manager, Diana as a commissioner in the newly organized Court of Appeals, June and Teresa as representatives, and Judy as press agent for the club. Youth Assembly officially began at 1:30 P.M. Thursday with a joint session with the Lieutenant Governor, Winston Miller, presiding. At this meeting Mr. Paul Judd, Mayor of the city of Frankfort, welcomed each delegate to his city and the 1962 Governor of Youth Assembly, Robert Rich, gave his State of the Commonwealth Address. When this meeting was adjourned each delegate attended their assigned session. These meetings were adjourned and the delegates then hurried back to their rooms to get ready for the Banquet at 6:00 P.M. in the cafeteria of the Capitol building. After everyone was finished with the meal Mr. Wendall P. Butler, State Superintendent of Instruction, spoke on education and political leadership. The evening session began at 8:00 P.M. The Lieutenant Governor, Winston Miller, presided over all meetings of the Senate and the Speaker of the House, Susan Kumpe, presided over all meetings of the House. After this meeting everyone was free to do what they wanted until 11:00 P.M. when the Dedication Service was held in the First Presbyterian Church. Here the Simon-Kenton Rhythmic Choir and their soloist were the main attraction. All members of the Governor's Cabinet took part in a program entitled "What Would You Have Done?" The second day began at 9:30 A.M. Friday with campaign speeches from districts 3A through 6 in the House and districts 7 through 11 in the Senate. In the afternoon session the candidates rotated from the House to the Senate and from the Senate to the House. It was during this time that Carol DeVillez introduced our district's candidate for governor, Tommy Wells from Murray. In the evening session Lone Oak Tri-Hi-Y and Hi-Y's bill, a constitutional amendment, was brought before the House and passed. This amendment changed the name of the General Assembly to the Legislature of the Commonwealth of Kentucky. At 10:00 P.M., that night everyone was back at the Capitol building for the Governor's Ball. The final session began with the remaining legislation hurried through before the joint session began. The Lieutenant Governor presided over this meeting until time to announce the results of the election. Governor Rich presented ten Kentucky Colonel awards and the Committee of Awards presented their awards. Mr. A. D. Litchfield presented awards to clubs taking part in the 2,000 point system and reaching the A, AA, or AAA rating. In this the Lone Oak Tri-Hi-Y received an award for getting 1850 of the 2,000 points. SURVEY OF MATH CLUB MADE

The Math Department of Lone Oak High School has made great progress in the last few years. It has sprung from a department which once offered only Algebra I, Algebra II, and Plane Geometry with only one instructor employed to a department which now offers 4 full years of math. Two full-time math instructors are now employed in addition to two part-time instructors. Beginning next school term Lone Oak will employ three full-time math instructors and one part-time instructor.

The enrollment in math courses has steadily increased with the present enrollment being as follows: Algebra I 175, Algebra II 25, Plane Geometry 85, and Trigonometry 16.

Each year math tests are given by the University of Kentucky to students at Lone Oak who have ranked high enough in their math courses to be eligible. These tests were given on April 7, 1962, in the Lone Oak cafeteria.

The interest in math has been aroused by many people. The following is a list of some of the outstanding math students who have attended Lone Oak the past few years and their present position: Charles Dallas (Rolla School of Mines), Nancy Smith (Graduate of Murray), Andy Clark (Georgetown), Fred Elliott (University of Kentucky), and Bill Obrien (Graduate of Murray).

From the above student's interest and enthusiasm sprang our Math Club. Eight of the Math Club's charter members are still attending Lone Oak.
