## ENROLLMENT HELD FOR 1962-'63

Enrollment for 1962-'63 classes at Lone Oak was held August 28 and 29, although registration actually took place last spring. Enrollment totalled 905 in grades 7 through 12.

There are 188 students enrolled in the seventh grade, 163 in the eighth grade, 167 in the ninth grade, 156 in the tenth grade, 139 in the eleventh grade, and 92 in the twelfth grade.

A speech was made by Mr. Robinson welcoming new students and explaining new classes now being offered. Business Law is being offered for the first time by Mr. Elbert Crooks.

Although crowded conditions exist, 204 classes are taught every day with 50 units of credit being offered.

## BAND ATTENDS STATE FESTIVAL

Lone Oak, the first McCracken County band to ever attend State Fair competition, placed in the top 10 among 28 bands. The trip to Louisville was financed partially by a band concert and ice cream festival held at the high school on Friday, September 7. About 1500-1600 people attended the event and \$554 was raised.

The 104 band members and 8 chaperons left on chartered buses from the school at 5:00 A.M. on Tuesday, September 11. Mr. Richard Petty, the band director, and about 21 other people went by car.

The Lone Oak band participated in the competition in the early evening, and the students were then free to see the rest of the fair.

They returned to Lone Oak on Wednesday, September 12.

Mr. Petty said, "The band received many compliments on their conduct," and that the Churchill Inn, where the band stayed, invited the Lone Oakers to return anytime.

The band will go to Mayfield, October 6, to compete in the Blue Grass Marching Festival and parade.

## Joe Sloan Is Merit Test Semi-Finalist

Joe Sloan has been named a semi-finalist in the 1962-'63 Merit Scholarship competition.

Joe, the senior class president, is the only Lone Oak student to achieve this rank in the 1962-'63 competition. He is among approximately 11,000 seniors throughout the country who attained semi-finalist status.

Joe became a semi-finalist because of his score on the qualifying test given at Lone Oak last March. The semi-finalists will take another test on December 1. Their score on this test will determine whether or not they will be finalists and win a four-year scholarship to the college they choose.

The names of the Merit Scholars will be announced April 24, 1963.

## Lone Oak Nine Heads For Second Undefeated Season

Lone Oak successfully opened its 1962 baseball season with a seven to six victory over Livingston Central in a game played at Lone Oak on September 6. Kenneth Grief led the Oakers with two hits in three trips to the plate. John Beaton, who was credited with the win, pitched the full seven innings for Lone Oak.

In their second game on September 11, the Flash beat Reidland three to one at Lone Oak. The Oakers were held scoreless and allowed only two hits until the bottom of the sixth. Then they got three hits for three runs to gain the win. Charlie Brown pitched the complete game for the Flash.

Lone Oak won its third straight game by edging past a tough North Marshall team by the score of 2 to 1. The Flash could manage only four hits in the game, but took advantage of two costly errors by the Jets in gaining their win. Charlie Brown's double was the only extra base hit for Lone Oak. John Beaton was the winning pitcher. His record now stands at 2-0.

Lone Oak got its fourth victory September 20, when they blanked Heath by the score of 11 to 0. Heath could manage only one hit off the pitching of Charlie Brown. John Beaton banged out three base hits for Lone Oak. This victory left the Flash in the first place in the Big "6" standings.

Lone Oak romped past Livingston Central by the lop-sided margin of 14-2 on September 25. Larry Jarvis led the Lone Oak cause with three hits. Freddy Howard was the winning pitcher.

The last road game of the season was played at Reidland on September 29. After the four road games, the Oakers play North Marshall and Heath at home on October 4 and 9, respectively.

Coach Johnson said, "We expect another year just like last year, but we need the backing of the students."
