A Word of Advice to High School Students

Dear Students:

Many of you are thinking of continuing your education after graduation from high school, and you are probably making an examination of the facilities of institutions of higher learning with a view to making your selection of a college or trade school to attend.

All high-school graduates with sufficient mentality should make every effort to continue their education after high school graduation. An advanced education will enable one to fill positions of responsibility in our modern complex society.

We would like to advise all of the seniors who are planning to go on to college that it is not necessary to pay tuition fees in advance to enroll at institutions of higher learning. Some colleges require a room deposit or a small registration deposit prior to registration. This is all right and is accepted practice among some of our better institutions.

However, it is not to your best interest to pay tuition charges in advance in order to get a "discount" or qualify for "scholarship" benefits.

It has come to our attention that certain institutions are making such representations to High School Seniors. We want to advise you against making payment-in-advance to get reduced rates. If you are approached by any college representative soliciting your enrollment and advance payment, we urgently suggest that you take the matter up with your High School Principal, and if possible get him and the college representative together for a discussion of the matter. If, after a satisfactory investigation, you and your principal deem it advisable to agree to make payment-in-advance on a college tuition charge, then you will be on safe grounds to do so.

But we want to insist that, as matters now stand, it is not necessary for high school graduates to make any sizeable deposit in order to be sure of admission to any reputable institution of higher learning.

Another bit of advice: If you are planning to go to business school in order to prepare yourself for office work, we strongly suggest that you attend a business school near your home or near the place where you intend to apply for a job. It is always easier to get work in the vicinity of the school you attend than it is to get work at a distance from the school you attend, even if that school is better than one near you. This holds true of many of the professions and your training therefore. For example, it is well for one who intends to practice law in a certain State to get his law training in that State; he becomes acquainted—during his law school training—with many of the future lawyers with whom he may come in contact in his practice of law.

We encourage high school seniors to try to go on with their education. Our country is blessed with many and efficient general arts colleges, both private and State supported, which are doing good work in equipping young people for the professions and for positions of leadership.

There are equally important jobs of clerical nature to be filled in the

business world. Our present-day free-enterprise system of life could not go on without competent stenographers, clerical assistants, filing and recording clerks, and other office personnel.

There are many fine business colleges in nearly every sizeable city which are doing a fine service in equipping young people for these clerical positions.

But just be sure that you are not duped into excessive before-hand payments in order to prepare yourselves for professional or office positions.

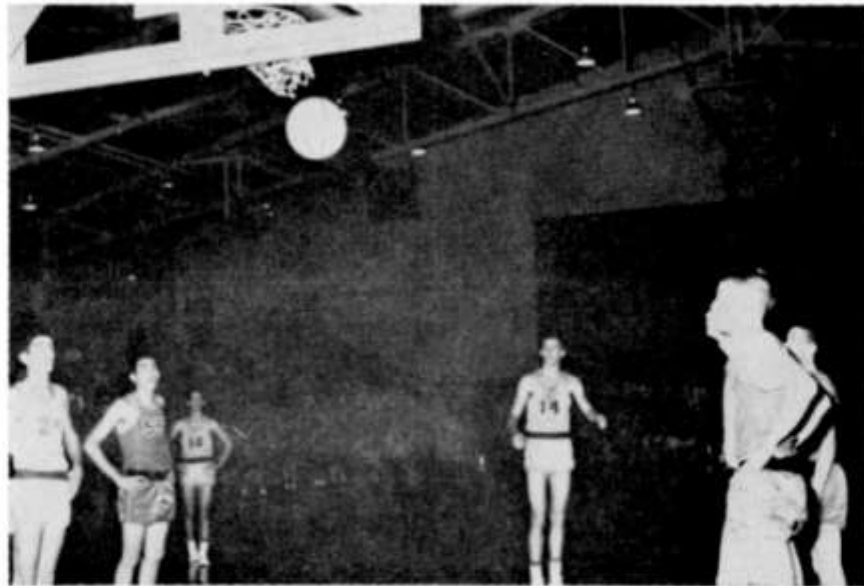
