Oak 'K' Editors Interview Governor

Paula Burks and Nancy Steinhauser of the Oak "K" were able to secure a personal interview with Governor Breathitt when he visited Paducah and our school last week. Since the events and circumstances surrounding the interview were a bit unusual, we wish to give the following account of events leading up to as well as during the interview.

Original plans called for the girls to speak briefly with the Governor when he visited our school. But the hurried schedule being kept, prevented this.

Being of persistent nature and strong wills, Paula and Nancy decided with Mr. Bolton's permission to try to see the Governor after he left the downtown luncheon he was scheduled to attend. Much to the girls surprise, this hope became a reality. As Governor Breathitt was leaving the luncheon our brave editors hailed him and explained who they were and what they desired. Governor Breathitt graciously said that he would be glad to give them a personal interview. In fact, he invited the girls to ride with him out to the television station where he was to tape an interview to be shown later. Thus, our editors sitting next to the Governor in a moving automobile gained the following interview. The questions asked and the Governor's response are as follows:

Paula: Should we discourage students (non-Ky. residents) from coming into our colleges and overcrowding us because tuition is lower?

Gov.: Yes, fees should be raised. We want everyone to have education, but Ky. residents should come first.

Nancy: The voting age in Ky. is considerably lower than that of other states. Do you feel that this affected your election in any way?

Gov.: "Sure do." 50% of the voters who voted for me were not even eligible to vote in 1955. The youth in Ky. is a new group to whom to appeal. I wish to better understand their wishes and objectives and to develop them.

Paula: Don't you feel the young people helped put you into office?

Gov.: Yes. I think they elected me.

Nancy: Should Communism be made a compulsory class for high school students?

Gov.: "I feel that it would be harmful if compulsory. I would favor government and civic classes teaching how our free form of government is superior to Communism and why we preserve our freedom and oppose Communism."

Paula: Would you encourage driver training programs?

Gov.: Yes.

Nancy: How have the people of Ky. reacted to the Civil Rights Law?

Gov.: The people of Ky. have dealt with it very well. All is going smoothly at this time.

Paula: Do you feel yourself more related to the youth of Kentucky because you are a young governor?

Gov.: Yes. I like to think of my-

Explains New Safe Driving Program

On Thursday of last week, Governor Edward T. Breathitt spoke to the students of Lone Oak High School. He urged us to be careful on our highways, fight for our country, and exercise our right to vote.

The Governor appeared 100% for the youth of our state. He said, "Our states progress is no swifter than your (students) progress. Your best efforts are needed to keep Kentucky moving." Stressing education, he said, "Those who learn more, earn more." He then added, "I would rather be a colossal failure than a mediocre do-nothing."

The Governor brought up the problem concerning traffic accidents in Kentucky. He stated that 1 of 3 in the assembly would, at some time, be involved in an accident. He pleaded, "You who have the most to lose should help. I can lead the campaign and support the police officials, but you are the young drivers." Speaking of the campaign he said, "If we save one life, it's worth it. I won't consider this program a success until arrests are reduced. Help me, please, on safety."

The Governor opened the assembly for questions from the floor. After answering each with as much as time would allow, he closed by saying, "I feel politics is a high calling. I urge you to fight for your country when you are called on, register and vote, and work for your party."

The Governor then jumped from the stage and shook hands with each member of Mr. Blackburn's Advanced Government class. Noticing one member wearing a Goldwater button he said, "I see we are pulling for different men, but I am glad to see you are pulling."

doing and by getting the news to them.

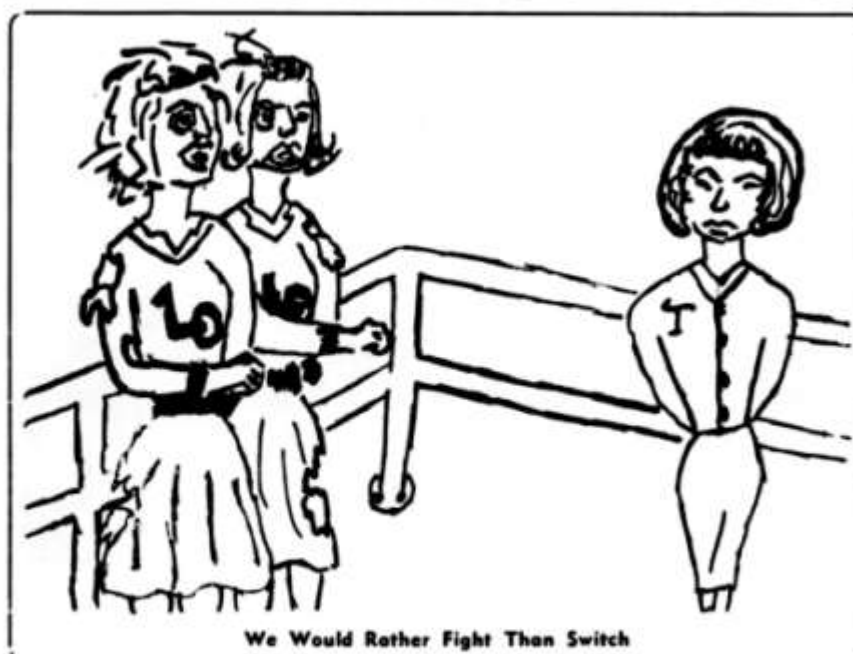

There have been many questions as to why isn't the baseball team playing any games this fall? The big answer is because most of the coaches in the county think it best not to have the fall league this year.

Probably the reason lies in the fact that out of the three county schools only one of the schools will have the same coaching staff. This is a factor in the fact that the new coaches feel that they need to take every chance possible to work with their basketball teams. They have also given excuses such as; "The boys play ball all summer and they are burned out on baseball by the time school starts". This may be true but, the boys are also in better shape having played ball all summer.

What does our baseball coach think of the subject? "I can see advantages and disadvantages to the situation. I think that this year it is important for the new coaches to have every opportunity to get a good look at their basketball teams. It takes a little time for the coaches to get across to the boys, their style of playing and on the other hand it takes even longer for the boys to really get the new style down in game condition. I also think that fall baseball gives the coach a chance to see more boys at their peak. I don't think that not having a fall schedule will hinder us because we have about forty boys out for baseball and if we had a schedule to play this fall there might be a talented few that might not get a good chance to display their ability to perform the basic fundamentals of throwing, catching and batting. I feel that having inter-squad games will give me a good chance to see a lot of boys in game situations."

What do you think our chances are for next spring? "I think that if we can get pretty good pitching we will give a lot of clubs a hard way to go."

Our baseball coach is Mr. Throgmorton, the music teacher. He was captain of the first baseball team at the new Paducah Tilghman High School. He also played for the "Cape State Indians" of Southeast Missouri State College at Cape Girardeau, Missouri.

New Sports Added To Lone Oak High

The Athletic Department has planned a full sports schedule for next spring. Besides the usual baseball and basketball teams, two new sports will be introduced at Lone Oak High School. These sports are golf and track.

Golf was started last year, but was not as well organized as it could have been. This year try-outs will be held and the best players will be chosen to represent the school.

A track team will also be started under the direction of Mr. Clark. Lone Oak had a track team a few years ago, but this was something the boys did on their own, without supervision. The coach this year will schedule the meets and have regular practice sessions.
