Concluding Part Of An Account Of A Trip Around the World

Our flight by Quantas jet, which left Singapore on the evening of July 26, was the longest single flight of our journey. We were in the plane about 13 hours, and traveled some 5,500 miles. We were at the Cairo, Egypt, Airport for about an hour, then flew to Beirut, Lebanon, where we took a taxi to Damascus, Syria, about 65 miles away.

Damascus is the oldest, continuously inhabited, city in the world. Most of the people there speak either Arab or French, but we were lucky to find an English-speaking man at our hotel, who also found us an English-speaking guide. He showed us the "Street Called Straight," the ancient wall of Damascus, and other places mentioned in the Bible.

Our ride from Damascus to Jerusalem, Jordan was such an enjoyable trip. We rode in two different taxis, were enroute about five hours, passed through Amman, the capital of Jordan, which was formerly called Philadelphia. We saw the native shepherds with their sheep, the farmers harvesting grain by hand, flocks of camels on the hills, small donkeys resting in the shade of large boulders on the mountainsides, passed through the Land of Jericho, over the Jordan River, past the Dead Sea, 1,200 feet below Sea Level, then on to Jerusalem, Jordan, by way of Bethany.

No pictures tell much about the real beauty and charm of the City of Jerusalem. Just after dawn on the morning of July 27 we took a walk to a point near the "Gate" of the Old City of Jerusalem, the walled city, and watched the people riding little donkeys laden with farm produce as they went through this ancient stone archway into the market places.

Later that morning we went to many of the places to which the Bible refers, and after our lunch another guide took us to the "Garden Tomb," and to the town of Bethlehem. Here we saw Rachel's Tomb, and the Church of the Nativity which is built over the stable place where the Child Jesus was born. All of this countryside is very picturesque with terraced olive groves, shepherd's fields, and small villages.

On the morning of July 31, we watched the sun rise over the Mediterranean Sea at Beirut, Lebanon, and about one hour later we were flying again, destination Geneva and Zorich, Switzerland. Our plane passed over the Isle of Crete, the Isle of Capri, and many of the other small islands along the coasts of Greece and Italy. The beautiful snow-capped Alps came into view about three hours after our departure, their white peaks showing the layer of clouds below us.

We were at the Airport at Geneva about 30 minutes, then were on our way again by Swissaire to Zurich. We rode by train from Zurich to Lucerne, the "story book" city of Switzerland, and were almost overwhelmed by the beauty and wonder of this land.

The streets and buildings were so clean and well kept, and the people whom we saw seemed so happy and contented. The seven-thousand foot peak of Mt. Pilatus stands guard over this quiet and beautiful city, and many other hills and peaks surround blue Lake Lucerne. We spent several hours hiking at the

Glacier Park and Museum, walking some of the famous streets of Lucerne and Zurich, and sitting at the sidewalk cafes, drinking coffee and eating some of their delicious cheeses

On Sunday the population turns out, and is all dressed up. All of the men have on their best suits, white shirts and ties, even if they are only going on an outing with the wife and children.

We left Zurich on Dutch Air Lines for Amsterdam, landed in this country of canals and dikes at nightfall, found a room with a Dutch family in a three-story apartment house, slept in our room on the third floor, ate bounteous Dutch breakfasts in our room, served by the teen-aged daughter. While in Amsterdam we rode on canals, took an all-day bus tour to Leyden, The Hague, and Delft, saw the flower auction, the windmills, and many other wonders of Holland.

August 4 came to London without any fog, and it was here that we saw one of the largest airports in all the world, and I truly believe, the best organized airport terminal of any place we landed in this tour. To any person who might tour Europe, we would say "by all means go to London for part of your trip!"

We shall forget much we saw here, as well as elsewhere, but I think we shall remember the Thames River, Big Ben, all of the many historic buildings we saw on our river trip, our walk to Trafalgar Square, then on to Buckingham Palce, the train ride through the countryside to Stratford-on-Avon, the double deck bus ride to Oxford—the time I set my watch to the chimes in one of the huge spires—then our most comfortable ride from Oxford to London. There was so much more to see!

The flight from London to Edinburgh was made in a smaller plane and we flew at 16,000 feet. Most of the time we could see the country as it spread out below us. We loved Scotland; we loved the City of Edinburgh. It was cold there; people were wearing top coats, sweaters, or heavy jackets.

We slept under woolen blankets at the hotel and were thrilled many times the next day when we took the all-day tour to Stirling, Aberfoyle, Callander, Dumfernline, the Tossachs, and Lock Katrine, riding a big bus over the hills that were splotched with white heather and bell heather. Yes, we saw kilts, and heard bagpipes, and ate "grilled loch fyne kipper" for breakfast.

On Sunday, August 8, we flew from Edinburgh to Shannon Airport in Ireland, stopping at Dublin for one half hour. We passed, at 12,000 feet, over the Isle of Arran, over Glasgow, Belfast, and other smaller Ireland towns. The landscape belies neither song nor story; and we haven't words to describe it.


