Mr. Goheen was a veteran of forty years of classroom and field teaching. He retired from vocational agriculture two years ago but continued to teach general science.

Born at old Birmingham in Marshall County, he began his teaching career there. He graduated from Birmingham high school and went to Murray. He finished college at Western State in Bowling Green since Murray

didn't offer the complete agriculture program.

In 1942 Mr. Goheen went to Reidland, after teaching agriculture at Henderson for a year. He left Reidland and transferred to Lone Oak in 1954.

He received many honors and awards during his long career. The Parent, Teachers Association made him a life member, last year for general service to the teaching profession.

Mr. Goheen would have been eligible for retirement at 65. He planned to farm exclusively for the first time in his life.

He was one of the founders of FFA in our area. His name will always be looked upon with pride at Lone Oak High School.

In Eastern Kentucky, there sits a boy in his early teens on the front porch of a run down shack high in the Appalachian Mountains. He has never attended school, he can't write his own name. His clothes are ragged, and he is doomed to live the rest of his life this way.

In the slums of New York City, a family of 12 live in a run-down apartment building. The building is over run with rats and roaches. The children do not attend school. Many of the children are suffering from malnutrition. Their father is a dope addict and their mother tries to support the family by working as a cleaning lady. The rent for the one room is \$30.00 a month. An extra five dollars is paid to the landlord so he won't turn them in because too many occupy the same apartment. Garbage is dumped in the backyard of the apartment and many times, the children eat what they can find in the dump.

Across the country, Indians on a desert reservation are starving to death. The Indians live in adobe houses which have no modern facilities. They live much as their ancestors did 100 years ago. But today there is one major difference, their game

supply was exhausted long ago. Yet they continue the struggle for survival.

You may think these conditions have been greatly exaggerated. Unfortunately these conditions exist all over the United States. You could help to improve these conditions. VISTA (or Volunteers in Service to America) is a government sponsored organization set up much as the Peace Corps. In the Peace Corps the volunteers leave the country. But why should we send our volunteers out of the country when our domestic situation is just as bad as the foreign situation, if not worse.

VISTA tries to improve the lives of our unfortunate people. If you are 18 and would like to devote a year of your life to help your fellow man why not look into VISTA. Your pay will be low and your work will be difficult but you will have the satisfaction of leading a great national effort to help fight the war on poverty at home. You alone will have the ultimate reward which comes to those who serve their fellow man.

## SAVE YOUR EARS!!

You are probably going deaf this very minute. I don't mean instantly, even though this is possible, but gradually. Everything, everywhere, is making noise. An over abundance of noise for a long period of time causes deafness by deadening the ear's sensitivity.

Loudness is measured by decibels. In a recent article by Herb Daniels he states that 'breathing makes a 10-decibel noise and normal conversation is about at a 60-decibel level.' If you are exposed to eighty decibels over an eight hour day, such as a factory worker, you will gradually become deaf.

Common things like a food blender, a floor waxer, an out-board motor, a lawn mower, and a motorcycle make sounds ranging from one-hundred to one-hundred ten decibels. Most of these things necessitate shouting at a person who is within a foot of you. If you work around it all day for a period of years, your hearing can be impaired. A noise can also be dangerous when you come out of being in it several hours. Your ears ring or you have a slight temporary loss of hearing.

Keeping in mind that a jet plane causes a roar up to one-hundred fifty decibels, and this can cause pain, it has been recorded that in some discotheque halls the amplified instruments make a sound ranging up to one-hundred and twenty-five decibels. How many times have you been to a dance when your partner could hear what you were saying with out shouting, unless of course it was during a break?
