A 'Fun' Lesson In How to Cook

A good many boyfriends are utterly spoiled by mismanagement. Some women keep them constantly in hot water; others let them freeze by their carelessness and indifference. Some keep them in a stew by irritating ways and words; some roast them, and some keep them in a pickle. It cannot be supposed that any boyfriend will be tender and good if he is treated this way, but if prepared properly, he can be really delicious.

In selecting your boyfriend, you should not be misled by the silvery appearance, as in buying mackerel, nor by the golden tint that salmon has. Be sure and select him yourself, as all tastes differ. Don't go to a market for him, as the best boys are always brought to your door.

It is better to have no boyfriend at all, unless you know how to "cook" him. A preserving kettle of finest porcelain is best, but an earthenware pumpkin will do, if cared for properly. See that the linen in which you wrap him is nicely washed and mended, with the required number of buttons and strings nicely sewed on. 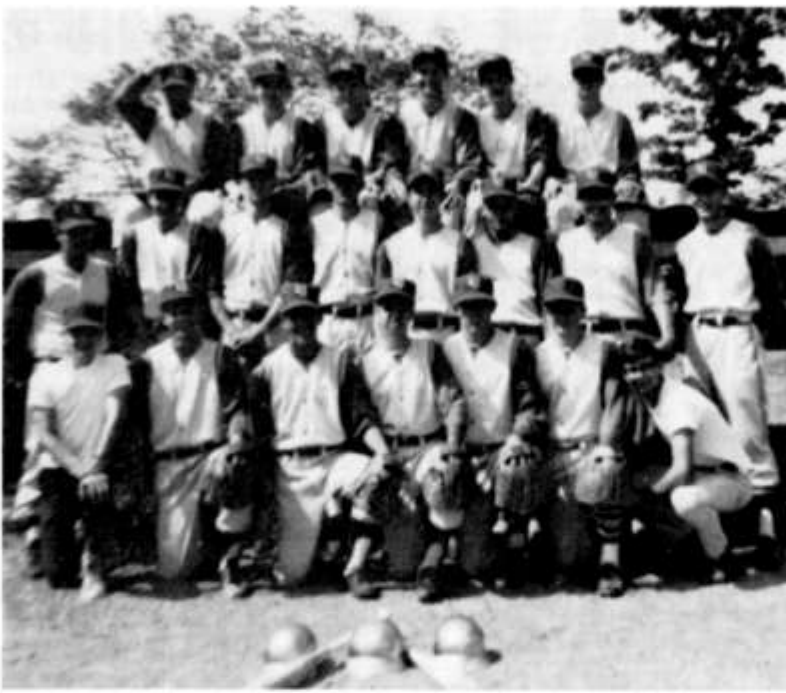
