Smith Mansion Toured

White Haven Reveals Past

How many times have you passed the old Smith mansion on Lone Oak Road and wished you could go in and unlock some hidden secrets of the past? Well, three Lone Oak students did go in and sadly enough, they found no vampires, skeletons or spirits of any kind. They did learn of the old home's past and its relation to the history of Paducah.

"White Haven," as it was first known, was built by William Anderson and construction was completed in 1861. The oaks in the yard were fully grown even then. Little boys, perched in the boughs, watched Civil War soldiers. Perhaps the troops of General Nathan Forest, who had their encampment less than a

mile away, march by on their way to the battlefields.

Ed Adkins purchased "White Haven" from William Anderson who in turn sold it to the family of James P. Smith.

When the family moved there some 62 years ago, Mrs. Smith, who was of Scottish descent changed the name from "White Haven" to "Bide-A-Wee" which means "Stay with us a while."

If you were a visitor to "White Haven" in the year 1861 you would have driven up the small dirt road resembling a cow path, which is now a four lane highway. Next, you would proceed up the driveway, where the

One of the most hip record labels around these days which records the Bee Gees, Cream, and the Iron Butterfly is Ato.

The album that got my attention and held it, this month, was "In-A-Gada-Da-Vida" by the Iron Butterfly. Although the singing leaves a little to be desired, the instrumentation, especially Doug Ingles' organ, more than makes up for it. The group's songs are inspirational, drifting from the solid beat of "Flowers and Beads" to the flowing organ of "Mirage." They all have that unmistakable Iron Butterfly mixture. The second side is composed entirely of one song, "In-A-Gada-Da-Vida," but what a song it is! The organ and guitar combine to form some of the wildest sounds since "Axis Bold As Love."

If you're thinking of buying a Jefferson Airplane album, get "Surrealistic Pillow." It's old and the cover isn't very pretty, but it's understandable and danceable.

Last month I mentioned Janis Joplin and the Holding Company. I've learned since that they have split for good and will make no more albums together. I fear one is lost without the other.

Closing out on records, I'd like to say, don't be fooled by colorful, great-looking record jackets. What you're paying for and will be listening to, is on the inside.

'The Bluesmen'

The Bluesmen, a novel by Samuel Charters, is not for Paul Revere and the Raiders fans, but for people seriously interested in understanding today's music; it is necessary to study the music of yesterday. All music is evolved from previous forms. Blues is the origin and basis for most

of this generation's music. This book discusses the structure of the blues as well as the great bluesmen. Such people as: Robert Johnson, Son House, Charlie Patton, Blind Lemon Jefferson, and Skip James are all discussed thoroughly.

To understand the blues, one must understand the conditions under which the songs are written. These men were all raised under hard conditions. They were nearly always poor and these facts are reflected in their songs.
