## Two Courses Are Added To Curriculum This Year

Two new courses, special education, taught by Mr. Baxter Riley and distributive education taught by Mr. Barry Perry, are being offered this year at Lone Oak, These two courses will reach 61 students.

Special education is a course set up for the slow learning and the handicapped, where each student can achieve at his own pace. The students, ranging in ages from 14 to 20, are taught to read, write, work simple math, and receive vocational training to prepare for future careers.

Another new course is distributive education. DE, as it is commonly referred to, is a 3-year program in retail training. It deals with merchandising, which is the buying of goods for the right market at the right time, place, quantity and price. It also includes marketing, which is the

direction of the flow of goods and services from producer to consumer, and management, which is the executive ability to control and direct business.

To take this course, interested freshmen apply and are interviewed. During the sophomore and junior year the student participates in classroom and laboratory activities and for three hours during the school day he is required to work at a training station. This phase is to correlate classroom and laboratory activities with job experiences.

This program can be terminal with students entering employment after high school. However students may enter college to study for careers in marketing or to be teacher-coordinators. Mr. Perry said, "Whatever the choice, the field of retailing is open wide for the youth of today."

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# For ACT To Take Test At PCC Center

Attention all seniors! The American College Testing Programs assessments examination is to be offered October 18 at PCC, Registration time for that date began August 25 and ended September 15. There will be five opportunities for all college bound students to take the ACT Test Battery during the 1969-70 academic year.

The 1969-70 ACT Test Battery is scheduled for:

Registration

Aug. 25-Sept. 15 Sept. 29-Nov. 10 Oct. 18 Dec. 13 Feb. 21 Nov. 24-Jan. 19 April 25 Feb. 2-March 23 July 18 April 6-June 15

Test Date

The ACT Test Battery is a series of tests designed to measure a student's ability to perform kinds of intellectual tasks typically required of college students. The subjects covered are English, math, social studies and the natural sciences.

Another part of the test is made up of questions which are aimed at informing prospective colleges about each student's background, non-classroom achievements and immediate plans for the future.

The fee for the test, which takes about three and a half hours to complete, is \$6.00. The results are sent to colleges and universities of the student's choice.

#### October Happenings

Did you know that these things happened in October? The Great Chicago Fire started on October 8, 1871.

John Brown siezed the arsenal at Harpers Ferry on October 17, 1859.

The first cable was laid by Samuel B. Morse on October 18,

After completing college and naval training, graduates are commissioned as officers in the Marine Corps or Navy, NROTC midshipmen participate in three summerat-sea training periods with various Naval units. The schools in Denmark have a day by day schedule. School occupies 36-37 hours per six week except for 12 weeks of vacation. The primary and secondary schools get Saturday off from May to October because of the lack of teachers.

Instead of small weekly tests, Tom has four big tests each year which take five or more hours to complete.

No restrictions are placed upon hair and dress length. The girls allowed to wear pants

The dating customs in Denmark and the United States are similar. They attend movies and dances just as American teenagers do.

One difference teenagers in America would really feel is requirements for obtaining a drivers license. Private instruction is required which cost \$120. The student spends from 10-20 hours with an instructor. Then a theory test is taken.

Tom's main problem is understanding the teachers and students. They talk to fast for him.

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
