Industrial Arts and **Business Departments** Offer New Courses

This year Lone Oak has initiated a new program called Business and Office CO-OP which is financed by the Bureau of Vocational Education. The program is open to seniors who have completed four classes in business prior to the co-op program. In addition these students must be interested in business as a career after high school or as a study in college.

At the present, there are 13 girls enrolled in the co-op program. They attend school in the morning and work afternoons and Saturdays. Miss Stewart secured the position for the girls, but she does insist they look themselves to become familiar with the employment market. Those who do not wish to co-op may enter simulated office practice which entails working in the school office for two hours each day.

Business and office co-opserves to bridge the gap between classroom training and on the job situations. The participants on the average receive the minimal wage. The employers are willing to pay these students as they train them. This helps the businesses and the school.

These students have assumed a large responsibility. They have maintained a high attendance record. Not only must they function efficiently on the job, they must remember they are examples of Lone Oak High School.




Flash Symbol Painted BySummers,Woodard


