# Do You Know The Origin of Halloween?

Halloween meaning hallowe; or holy evening was the day before All Saints Day to the early Celts and Druids. This was their substitution for New Years Eve since the new year then began on November 1. This celebration was also called Samhain, meaning the end of the summer and the beginning of winter.

The Druids tried to placate the Lord of Death. It was believed that the spirits of those who had died during the past twelve months were allowed on this one occasion to visit their homes for a few hours. It was also an important rite to light great bonfires on hilltops to honor the sun god and to frighten away evil spirits that had been released on that special night. These people then put on grotesque masks and danced around the fires pretending that evil spirits were pursuing them. The Druids also believed a cat to be scared. Supposedly, a cat was once a human being but was changed because of his evil deeds.

Some folks came to believe that on Halloween night that people could tell fortunes by performing such rituals as jumping over lighted candles.

It was also believed that on Halloween night that dead spirits roamed the earth and the only way to get rid of them was to build big bonfires.

There are many superstitions connected with halloween. A very interesting superstition is the origin of the Jack-O-Lantern. There was once a man named Jack who could not enter heaven because of his miserliness. He could not enter hell because he had played tricks on the devil. He was supposedly left on the earth to roam with a lantern until the day of judgement.

Early tribes thought Halloween was a time for divination or fortune telling. The priest cut an animal open and foretold the future from the entrails. Young people often peeled an apple, threw the peeling over his shoulder, and from its shape told the initial of a sweetheart. And there was also a belief that if anyone ate a crust of bread before going to sleep, any wish that he made would come true.

Girls tried to discover who their husbands would be in this way; the girl carried a candle along a dark hall or down a stairway and hoped to see the face of her future mate in the mirror held in the other hand. If he selected and empty one he would be a bachelor, if the bowl contained muddy water he would marry a widow, while the one with clear water meant he would marry a young girl.

In some foreign lands, Halloween is an asester time; and many people attend Black Vespers. It is customary to set out food for departed souls.

As the years went by, harmless, though often "daring" pranks gave way to behavior that was boisterous and destructive. This increased after World War II.

Now very few children are allowed to "Trick or Treat" without their parents. Thus alot of the spirit is gone. Please try to remember the original meaning and enforce it.

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# Della Barnes Is Local Attraction

With Halloween just around the corner, Graveyard "visitors" are busy again. Probably the most talked about and frequently visited tombstone in Paducah is that of Della Barnes.

This tombstone is actually a statue which stands in the old section of Oak Grove Cemetery. A talented Italian artist carved the lifesize statue out of expensive Italian marble in 1898. Many who knew Della say that it is an exact likeness of her.

The artist was very skillful and precise in detailing this beautiful monument. He shows Della standing in a long, elegant dress with acordion pleats. Many say that this is her wedding dress. She is holding a bouquet of rose buds.

Vandals have been a problem for the cemetery keepers, and Della has been a prime target. Once, her entire face was painted with black ink. It took many years for this to be removed. Another time, lipstick was applied to her stone lips. Hats and coats have often appeared on this white statue. Even now, Della

has a streak of red paint going down the front of her dress and she no longer has any fingers.

Della Barnes died tragically in 1897 at the age of twenty-three. Many different stories have been passed down through the years concerning her death.

One of the most persistent is that she was married and she tricked her husband into stabbing her to death.

The "myth" is that Della loved roses and often wore a bouquet on her dress, over her heart. One day, Della concealed a dagger in the roses, pointed to her heart. When her husband came home and hugged her, she was stabbed to death.

A different version of this story, is that Della had second thoughts about her coming marriage. On her wedding day, she put the dagger in her roses, and when Della and her husband began to dance at the reception, she was stabbed.

There are many variations of a story concerning Della's diamond wedding ring. Each story relates

to the missing ring finger on the statue's right hand.

One story is that she was murdered and that her killers cut off her ring finger in their haste to steal her ring.

Another is that her husband wanted a divorce. When Della wouldn't give in, he killed her and cut off the finger in order to get the ring.

Still another story is that after she had died and been buried, grave robbers dug up her grave and cut off her finger to steal the ring. After that the ring finger on her statue fell off.

A superstition related to these stories is that if you cover the statue's hand in any way, you will die.

According to the present caretaker at Oak Grove, Della's fiance never showed up at their wedding. Three days later, Della committed suicide by stabbing herself with a pair of scissors.

Another superstition is connected to this story. It has been said that if you pass by her statue without first bowing down and then stabbing the ground with a pair of scissors, you will have bad luck.

The story which probably holds more truth appeared in a Paducah paper on Monday, June 28, 1897. The headline read: ACCIDENTAL POISONING CARRIES OFF MISS DELLA BARNES OF WEST JEFFERSON.

This article set the date of Della's death as Sunday, June 27, 1897, at 5 o'clock a.m. She had been found in an unconscious state at about 11 o'clock.

According to the statement given by her roommate, Miss Barnes took a glass of water, poured some powder into it, and said that she intended to take five grains of calomel before she went to bed.

She then drank a glass of sweetmilk and became ill. She prepared another glass of water with more powder and drank that. The roommate was awakened about two hours later by Della's groans, but was unable to awaken her.

capsules, but said that they choked her, and she was going to take it in powder form. An investigation later proved that she had instead taken morphine, which killed her. With all the "wild" rumors about suicides and murders, actually Della died by accident—or did she?? What do you think?

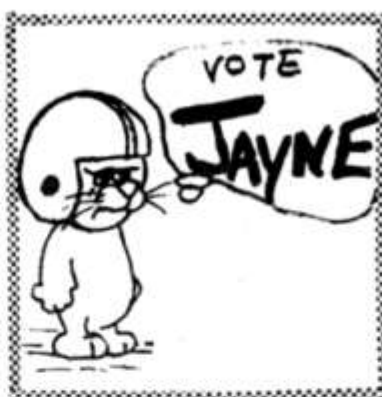

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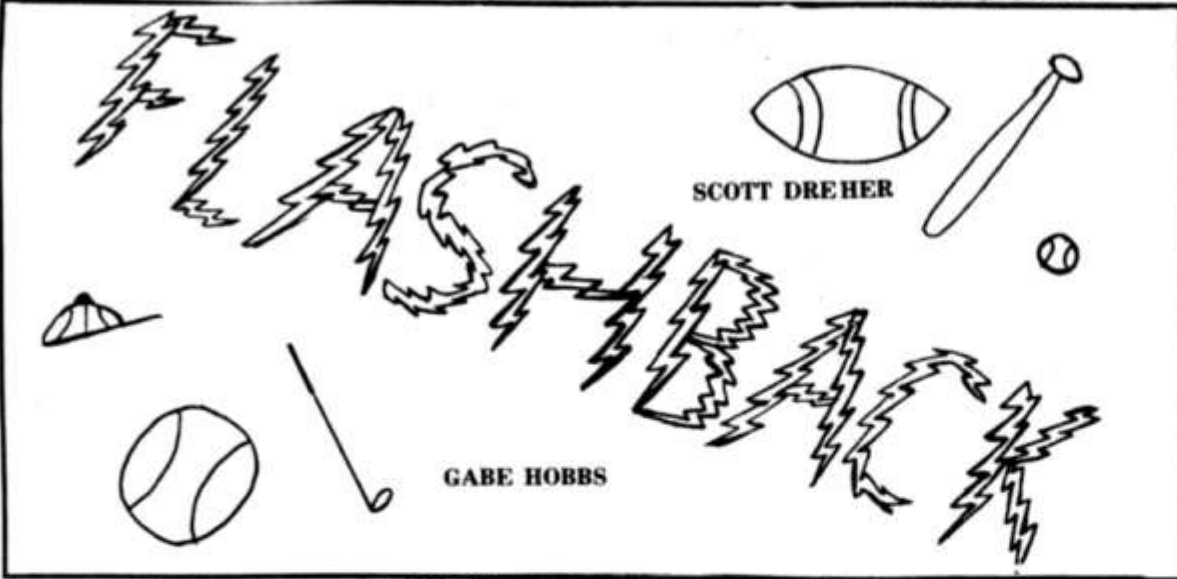
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## Lone Oak Looks Forward To Promising Cage Season
