LOHS Has Three National Merit Semifinalists

Three Lone Oak students have the band. been selected as National Merit Semifinalists in the 1975 competition. The fortunate students from Lohe Oak are Janwin Overstreet, Michael Cramer, and Keith Feather. They are just a small segment of the more than 15,000 students nationwide who qualified as Semifinalists. About 3,400 Merit Scholarships will be awarded in the coming year.

Janwin plans to attend Murray State University as a music major. She is serving as co-editor of the newspaper this year, and is co-treasurer of the choir.

Mike will enter the University of Louisville next fall, and plans to

study pharmacology.

The three took the 1973 Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test-National Merit Scholarship qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) as juniors, along with other members of their junior class. Since the test was taken on October 23 of last year, it has taken nearly a year for any information to come back. The PSAT/NMSQT was administered to a total of 1,134,635 students in 17,484 secondary schools.

In Kentucky, there were 235 Semifinalists, representing 91 schools. The qualifying score, in the state of Kentucky, out of a possible 240 was 189.

The Semifinalists must qualify as Finalist in order to be eligible for scholarships. Besides filling out various forms, they must confirm presently serving as president of their high test scores by an equal

performance on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT). It is expected that 90 per cent of the Semifinalists will become finalists.

Every Finalist is eligible to compete for one of the National Merit \$1,000 scholarships, which are awarded according to each state's percentage of graduating high school seniors. These one-time awards are supported by business and industrial sponsors, as well as the NMSC's own funds.

Many Finalists will also be considered for an approximate total of 2,400 renewable four-year scholarships. These are financed by sponsors including corporations, unions, trusts, professional associations, colleges, and foundations, numbering about 550 in all. Depending upon the award, or financial need of the student, a Finalist could receive up to \$1,500 per year for four years of college.

women are moving in! Basketball is no longer only a boy's sport, for this year the girls will be playing the game too. This came about because of the new law stating that if a school sponsors a boys basketball team they must also

sponsor a girls' team. Several area schools began their girls' basketball team last year, Ballard Memorial, St. Mary, and Carlisle County high schools being among them. This is the first year for Lone Oak to have a girls' team. When the girls' coach, Dennis Griffith, was asked his opinion about girls' basketball, he stated, "I think it's a good idea. I feel that if boys are allowed to compete in athletic events, that the girls should be allowed also, if it's a sport that they are capable of participating in."

And the girls at Lone Oak have proved themselves capable. Most who are trying out for the team began practicing and learning the fundamentals of the game last practice this fall. For the past few weeks they have been working hard to improve their skills in time for coming tryouts.

Mr. Griffith, who has four years of boys' basketball and served as referee for games, says that there are more girls trying out for the team than he expected and that though the girls need a lot of practice, as does any team, they were much better and more enthusiastic and serious about playing than he had anticipated. He feels that our team holds a very good chance in competing with other schools.

The team will consist of 15 members and will play by the same rules as in boys' basketball. The calendar for the team has 13 games scheduled so far, the first of which is to be played December 10 against Ballard County. Nine of these games will be preliminary to the boys' varsity games. The girls will also participate in a district, regional, and state tournament.

Freshman Cheerleaders Selected


Tuesday, September 17 was an exciting day for 14 Freshmen girls, who were trying out for cheerleader.

The girls tried out in front of ten judges. They were judged on appearance, ability to do an individual cheer, gymnastics, jumps, and how well they respond in a group cheer.



Lone Oak Meets Tilghman on the Grid

Two long touchdown runs early in the game by Tilghman's Ronnie Williams ruined an otherwise fine showing by a determined Oaker squad, handing the Purple Flash a 20-2 defeat at McRight Field.

The long-awaited contest opened in a dazzling manner. On the first play from scrimmage, Ronnie Williams broke through the right side and, as Lone Oak fans goggled in disbelief, raced 55 yards to score. Clark booted the extra point, giving Tilghman a 7-0 lead.

Minutes later, after an unsuccessful series of plays and a Midkiff punt, Tilghman took over deep in their own territory. After two successive plays resulted in a loss of yardage, Williams, a 5'5" senior halfback crashed through the line and dashed 90 yards down the left side to give the Tornado a 13-0 advantage. The extra point kick by Jones made it 14-0. To say the least, the Oakers had their work cut out for them.

And work they did. Minutes later, the Flash gained possession at their own 27 yard line after a Tilghman fumble. Behind some strong running and a key pass to Kent Koster, they marched deep into Tornado territory, mounting their first scoring threat. But, after failing on a fourth-down situation, Tilghman took over once again. The pattern had been set for the remainder of the first half, with the score holding at 14-0 until the half's end.

The third quarter held little excitement for neither Lone Oak or Tilghman fans until late in the quarter, when the Oakers recovered a Tilghman fumble deepin Tornado territory. After two small gains, the third quarter ended, and both teams moved to the opposite end of the field. On the opening play of the fourth quarter, Edwards gained a first down, and the Flash had another excellent scoring opportunity. But, in stepped the Tilghman defense (James Greer, in particular) and forced yet another fumble at the Tilghman seven.

Three plays later, the equally greedy Oaker defense prompted a fumble at the Tilghman eleven. But, the veteran defensive line of Tilghman stopped the Flash once again, maintaining their 14-0 advantage.

Minutes later, the Lone Oak defenders stopped Tilghman cold, forcing a punt. When the hike to the punter, Sanders, sailed into the end zone and was downed by the Blue for a safety, the Flash had two points on the scoreboard, making the score 14-2.

Tilghman's last tally occurred when the punter, Midkiff, faked a punt and threw the ball into the hands of Tilghman's Tony Clark, who raced 60 yards for a Tornado touchdown, which proved to be the last score of the game, as the extra point attempt was deflected by Mike Farrell.

For the game, the Oakers held the edge in total yardage, 214-208, with the majority of Tilghman's yardage coming on the long runs of Williams.

The determination of the Oaker defense in the latter stages of the game shows in the statistics, as they held the defending state champs to a net gain of less than twenty yards in the second half.

Mark Edwards, the Oaker quarterback completed 7 of 21 passes for 78 yards. Hamilton and Hollowell led the Flash rushing attack with 62 and 54 yards, respectively. Kelly Don was named "Player of the Week" for his contributions on both offense and defense. Pickering and Reeves were given "honorable mention" for their exploits in the game, which evened the Lone Oak record

The win boosted the Purple Flash record to 3-1 and dropped the Pilots to 1-2.


Flash Tromped Trojans 39-13
