On April 26, 1975, seven Lone Oak students were winners at the West Kentucky Regional Science Fair held at Murray State University.

The five divisions for entry of projects were chemistry, biology, earth science, math, and physics.

Alan Swinney received first place award in the Chemistry division for "Calculation of the Solubility Products using ion-exchange Resins." Gregory Englert received first place in Physics for "Calculator Physics." Second Place in Chemistry was awarded to Mark Goode for "Qualitative Analysis." Third Place in Physics was given to Gary Feather for "Circuit Analysis."

Winners in Group Projects were: Mike Stephens and Cindy Lee, first place on "Separation and Identification of Alcohols by Physical, Chemical, and Instrumental Methods"; and Leonard Staton and Phil Cagle, first place on "The Conservation of Momentum using Video-Tape recorder".

Gary Shrewsbury received Honorary Mention for "The Study of Thermodynamic Transfer."

Choir Wins In St. Louis Competition

At 6:45 on April 25 the Lone Oak A Cappella Choir left for St. Louis. The choir, directed by Mr. George Murphy, went to participate in the Six Flags Over Mid-America Choral Festival.

Entered in Class AA, the choir received three superiors to capture second place in their class. The winning choir was Pearl High School from Nashville, Tennessee. This choir received two superiors and a superior plus to capture the title. Also they had a small orchestra playing with them.

The three songs the choir presented were: "Hodie Christus Natus est," by Healey Willan, "She Walks in Beauty," by David Foltz, and "Holy Radiant Light" by Gretchaninoff. The choir performed their numbers at 4:20 p.m. at the Breckinridge Ramada Inn on Interstate 44.

The results of the festival were announced the following day, April 26, at Six Flags Over Mid-America. Five Kentucky schools were represented at the festival. Of the five choirs, Lone Oak was the only one to receive a superior rating. The choirs were divided up in the classes as follows: two choirs were in AA, two in AAA, and one choir in AAAA. A total of three choirs received superior ratings and only six choirs out of the 35 competing received superior ratings.

The contest attracted choirs from as far away as Oklahoma City, Baton Rouge, and Minnesota.

One comment about the festival was made by Mr. Murphy following the competition. "The contest was a valid experience for the students and I was glad that I found out how the choirs was ranked in the state and the country."

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
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Superiors Awarded At Banquet
