One of the September teacher profiles is on Mr. Behrendt. He is starting his fourth year as principal at L.O.H.S. When asked if he thought the attitude of the students had changed during the years he has been here, he replied "Yes." He added that this year the attitude is tremendous and congratulated the students for getting the year off to a good start. Mr. Behrendt felt part of this change was due to the fact that students were learning what to expect under him.

He felt that the changes made this year were for the better. Concerning the restrictions on getting out of Directed Study, he said that a good deal of the trouble in school last year was caused by students excused from their Directed Study on the pretext of going to a particular place and then not being there. Junior Girls Attend KYC

This summer four junior girls from L.O. attended the Kentucky Youth Conference. The conference was held at Transylvania University in Lexington this year. Two students, Delane Nagel and Julie Daniel were chosen as seminar leaders. They arrived June 16, three days ahead of the delegates. In these three days they learned about the topics to be discussed during the conference and tips on leading group discussions. Rita Miller and Lisa Summers attended the conference as delegates. Each delegate was assigned to a seminar group under two leaders.

Throughout the conference workshops, general assemblies, and seminar sessions were held. Some of the workshops held this year were, Nuclear Energy vs. Solar Energy, Historic Preservation, Juvenile Rights, Alternatives in Education, Equal Rights, and the Kentucky Youth Lobby.

Quite a few delegates were interested in the Youth Lobby. The delegates who joined this will visit local representatives and state senators urging them to pass certain laws. A few years ago the Kentucky Youth Lobby wrote a students rights bill and helped get it passed.

Assemblies were also an important part of the conference. Delegates listened to the following speakers: Dr. Lyman Ginger, Kentucky Superintendent of Public Instruction; Dr. Thomas Crawford, Professor of Chemistry, University of Louisville; Robert Gable, Republican Candidate for Governor; Congressman Carroll Hubbard; and a panel discussion on Kentucky and the Energy Industries. After each talk students were urged to ask the speaker questions.

Tommy shares with traditional operas a foolish story, this one having to do with a deaf, dumb, and blind boy who becomes a pinball champion, a hero and a new messiah.

The movie in entirely sung:

several added narrative parts and some lavish production numbers. Tommy is just strong rock n roll, sometimes raunchy, sometimes highfalutin. Tommy stirs a memory of a lyric from an old Jerry Lee Lewis song: it shakes your nerves and it rattles your

When Tommy (The Who's Roger Daltry) meets the Pinball Wizard (Elton John) in a championship match, the Wizard looks like a character from the other side of an electronic looking glass. Shirt full of glitter, several pairs of suspenders holding up his pants, he perches in front of his pinball machine on seven-story

pinball machine on seven-story platform shoes, singing Pinball Wizard. Tommy defeats him, and our last sight of the Pinball Wizard is only of his shoes, upended, being carried away by the screaming crowd.

Tommy's mother (Ann Margret) watches her television set actually spew forth the waste from all its commercials. Baked beans, soapsuds, melted chocolate gush like a lava flow, and, like any good consumer, she grovels in the mixture. The religious celebration is a faith healing held at the altar of a very modern goddess, Marilyn Monroe. As the crippled faithful rush to receive Communion and touch her statue, Eric Clapton, in a priest's raiment sings "Eyesight for the Blind."

The movie is fantastic to look at, all in gaudy picture-postcard colors. It is acted with appropriate nerve by all, including Tina Turner as the down and dirty Acid Queen. In this scene, The Acid Queen tries to get a response out of the deaf, dumb, and blind teenager by putting him in a six foot silver case that has built-in syringes all over it. When she closes the case, the syringes inject every part of his body with LSD.

A lot of peole ask "Why don't they make good musicals anymore?" Well, Tommy is one, although not at all designed to please the taste of folks who prefer the musicals of the 30's and 40's. Right now Tommy is entertainment, Tommy is the new musical, and it will stand.



be of service to community groups, and etc.






FBLA Officers Attend Camp
