# Lone Oak Student Wins National FFA Recognition

Four members of the Future Farmers of America have been named regional recipients of the FFA Placement in Agricultural Production Award co-sponsored by Hesston Corporation of Hesston, Kansas, and the Shell Chemical Company of San Ramon, California, as a special project of the National FFA Foundation, Inc. One of the four will be named the national winner in Placement in Agricultural Production at the Thursday morning session (November 13) of the 48th National FFA Convention in Kansas City, Missouri.

The four regional award recipients are:

Southern Region—Eddie Wayne Blizzard, Scottsboro "A" Chapter, Alabama;

Western Region—Jimmy Dean Hill, Parker FFA Chapter, Arizona;

Central Region—Jeffrey Slusmeyer, Lone Oak FFA Chapter, Kentucky;

Eastern Region—Neal Wilkinson, South Rowan FFA Chapter, N.C.

The Placement in Agricultural Production Award is one of 19 Agricultural Proficiency Awards presented annually by the National FFA Foundation, Inc., to recognize accomplishments of FFA members pursuing careers in agriculture. Applicants for the Placement in Agricultural Production Award must describe activities and experiences on a producing farm which provide a background for career development in production agriculture.

All FFA members who complete supervised experience programs involving placement on farms not

owned or operated by the student's family as part of their vocational agriculture instruction are eligible for the award. To participate FFA members submit an application on which they answer questions in ten areas related to their placement program. Requirements include listing goals and future objectives, a record of annual earnings and expenses, a record of other sources of income, a financial statement, a description of the student's training plan, a listing of specific experiences, a listing of skills and competencies gained and a listing of FFA and other school activities in which the student participated. Finally, the student must give a brief biography and a statement from the instructor or employer.

Chapters may recognize a member for the Placement in Agricultural Production Proficiency Award by presenting a medal and a certificate. Chapter winners may compete at the state level where the winner is presented a check for \$100 from the National FFA Foundation, Inc. State winners then compete for recognition in each of the four FFA administrative regions. Each regional winner earns a check for \$250 and a plaque plus partially paid travel expenses to the National FFA Convention in Kansas City, Missouri. Here his Placement in Agricultural Production program is judged against winners from three other regions. The top FFA member in the nation

regions. The top FFA member in the nation in Placement in Agricultural Production is recognized at the National FFA Convention with a plaque and a check for \$500.

As sponsors of the Placement in Agricultural Production Proficiency Award, The Hesston Corporation, and the Shell Chemical Company provide funds for awards, travel for winners and administrative expenses.

Jeff is 18 and lives on Route 6, Box 103, Paducah, Kentucky. Jeff also attended Lone Oak High School having two advisors: Mr. Wayne Ezell and Mr. Harold Wood. Jeff's parents are Mr. and Mrs. James O. Slusmeyer.

Jeff Slusmeyer is the Central Regional winner of the FFA Placement in Agricultural Production Award. He wants to be a farmer and is working toward that goal through his vocational agriculture instructor visits him on the job regularly. Through the experience program Slusmeyer has learned to milk, and feed the dairy herd. He operates the farm machinery and has learned to handle all phases of the farming operation, from mixing feed to operating and performing maintenance on farm machinery. According to his vocational agriculture teacher, Slusmeyer is an industrious young man and an excellent student.

Jeff's FFA activities are Chapter Vice President, and President, Star Greenhand, and Mechanics, Dairy and Meats Teams. His other outside activities is being a Farm Bureau Member.

## Band Attends Morehead

On November 7-8th the Kentucky Colonel Band participated in the Morehead Blue and Gold Marching Contest in Morehead, Kentucky. The contest, which hosted 20 bands from states such as Indiana, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, and Kentucky, was held from 9:00 to 12:00 a.m. on the morning of the 8th.

There were two divisions in the contest, they were called Blue division and Gold division. The name of each band was put in a container and drawn out one at a time. This determined the division and when each band would perform. The Colonels were selected for the Gold division and were the 13th band to march.

After marching in the morning session the Colonels went back to their buses and ate a sack lunch provided by Morehead University. At 1:00 all the bands assembled in the football stadium for the football game between Morehead and East Tennessee. Five minutes prior to the game the second place winners of each division were announced and they marched for third and fourth place overall.

Approximately five minutes

before halftime the first place winners of each division were announced. During halftime they performed to determine first and second place overall.

The order of finish overall in the contest is as follows; Fourth place: Tates Creek, Kentucky, Third place: Meade County, Kentucky, Second Place: Lafayette, Kentucky, First place: Greenwood, Indiana.

The place the Colonels received for their performance is uncertain at the moment because the scores haven't been sent from Morehead.

Transportation for the trip was on chartered buses. The band departed Friday morning at 9:00 a.m. and arrived in Lexington, where they spent the night, at approximately 3:00. After practicing and getting checked into the motel the band ate supper at a Blue Boar Restaurant and went shopping in the Fayette Mall.

Departure from the motel, was at 8:00 the following morning to Morehead. They arrived back in Paducah at 11:20 p.m.

The next trip for the Colonels will be to Frankfort for the Governor's Inauguration Parade.

# Cat Stevens: Star of the Soft Rock

What makes a rock singer well liked by today's young people? It could be his good looks, his fantastic music, his weird clothes or just anything. The rock singer described above probably sounds like Elton John, who is one of today's most popular musicians. Well minus the weird clothes and you have Cat Stevens, one of best in a chosen few.

Cat Stevens got started at age seventeen by a fast talking promoter who was bound to make him a star. With all the socializing it took to become a star it took a toll on Cat and in 1969 he was hospitalized with one lung collapsed, the other threatening to go, and a case of tuberculosis.

After a long period of convalescence he came back to the public a different person. Cat Stevens music had changed from a rollicking and bouncy beat to a sensitive type such as old medieval ballads. The first album of such was MONA BONE JACKON. Cat followed it with new albums such as TEA for the TILLERMAN,

TEASER AND THE FIRECAT and a coast to coast tour of the U.S. He was a roaring success with audiences in cities all over the country.

Cat Stevens is a highly sensitive person, introspective quiet. He doesn't like stadium scenes and other similar large places to have his concerts. He says he feels there is a kind of limit. Six thousand people is a maximum, with more than that you can't see the performer. Cat Stevens is a performer you have to see to get the full appreciation of his music. To see the way he hunches over his guitar or piano and throws himself into total absorption of the music is something within itself. He is nothing less than magnificent.

Cat Stevens real name is Steven Demitri Georgiu, born July 21, 1948 which makes him the ripe old age of twenty-seven. His father was Greek-born and he has a Swedish mother.

Steve writes most of his own music and many times in cars,



planes and hotel rooms. His song "Eighteenth Avenue" from CATCH BULL AT FOUR was written in the Kansas City airport running for gate 22.

From listening to the music and lyrics of Cat Stevens songs one can feel as though they know him. His music can relate to every person that takes time to listen.

Cat Stevens is not only one of the best, Cat Stevens is the best.
