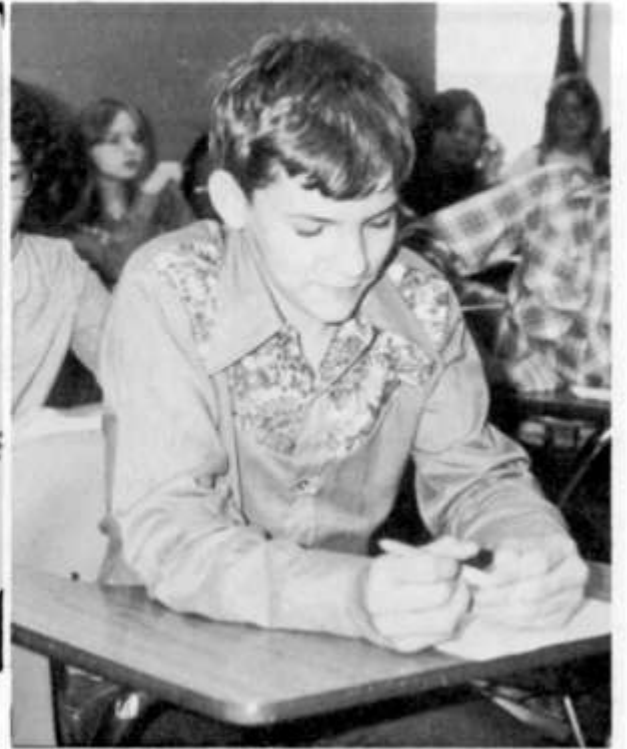

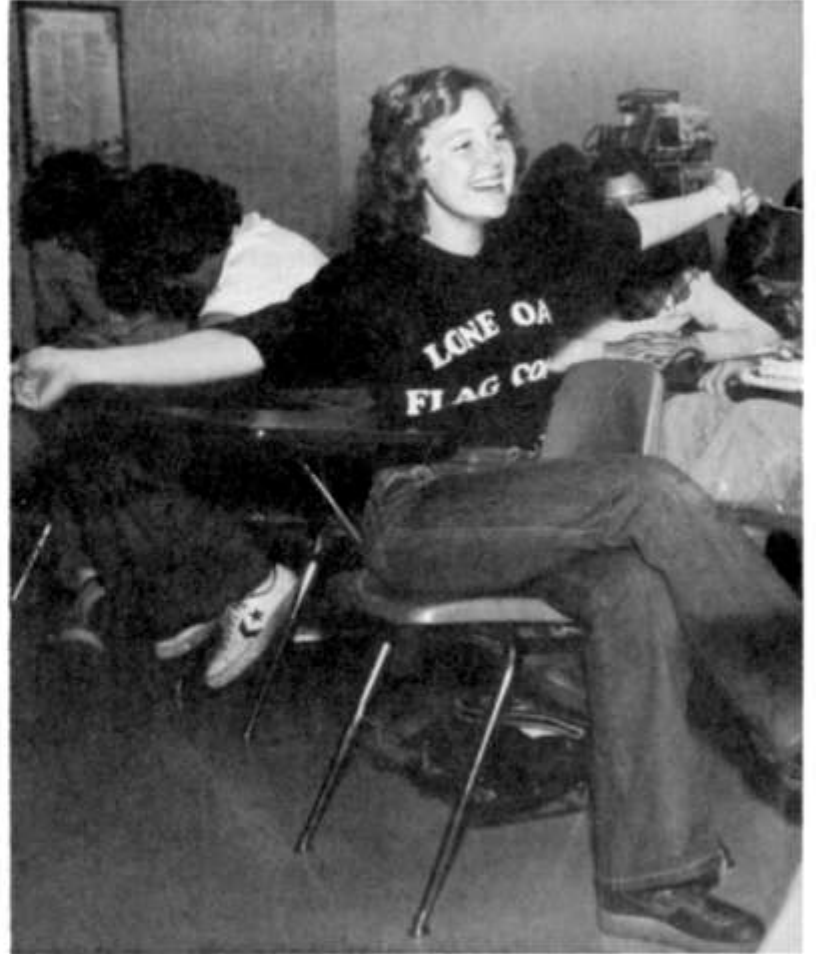

## 5 Place In Science Fair

Freshmen Alicia Thompson and Debbie Swatzell captured first place in senior high physics competition in the 1978 regional science fair in Murray, Kentucky. Their project was a solar heat collector unit. This unit is a model which collects the sun's rays. The solar heat unit would be connected to a house if it was built in large scale. Other students who participated in the science fair and also placed were Junior Keith Sullivan, Seniors Barry Elliot, and Danny Clark.

Alicia and Debbie both won the grand prize last year at the Lone Oak Junior High science fair with their eminent heat collecting unit.

Senior Barry Elliot accepted second place in senior high competition with his outstanding chemistry project. The project separates nickel and cobalt by ion exchange. Barry obtained information and facts about his project from a downtown water lab which showed him how to put it together.

Senior Danny Clark won first place in physics competition with his project. The project measures the rate of flow of gases that could not be determined by a rodometer.

Junior Keith Sullivan introduces a project which explores the possibilities of using lifters in our area and their advantages over other sources of hydro-electric power. Keith's discrete project is the study of lift translators as an alternate to hydro-electric dams in the midwest. He devised the project because he wanted to do something relevant to today's technology and think up something original that people can use in their own area. Keith placed third in the senior high physics competition.

# Are You High Or Low?

Employees of the McCracken County Health Department recently visited Lone Oak. They came to check the blood pressure of the students and faculty.

These employees go to all senior high schools in the area testing students' blood pressure. It was estimated that 50% of the students at Tilghman were tested while other schools averaged from 90% to 100%.

Blood pressure is the force with which blood pushes against the walls of your blood vessels. Thus, your blood pressure is determined by the size of your arteries. Wide arteries mean lower blood pressure while narrow arteries mean higher blood pressure.

When your pressure is taken, a cuff is wrapped around the upper part of your arm. It is then inflated to stop the blood flow in the main artery. The air is then let out causing the blood to flow again. The force of blood at the moment your heart beats is measured and recorded as the systolic pressure. When the heart stops, the force of blood when the heart is resting is the diastolic pressure.

In most cases a reading of 120/80 is within the "normal" range for a person from 18 to 45 years old. The first number refers to the systolic pressure while the last refers to the diastolic pressure.

If your blood pressure reading was low, you probably have nothing to worry about. If it was high, however, seeing your doctor is a good idea.

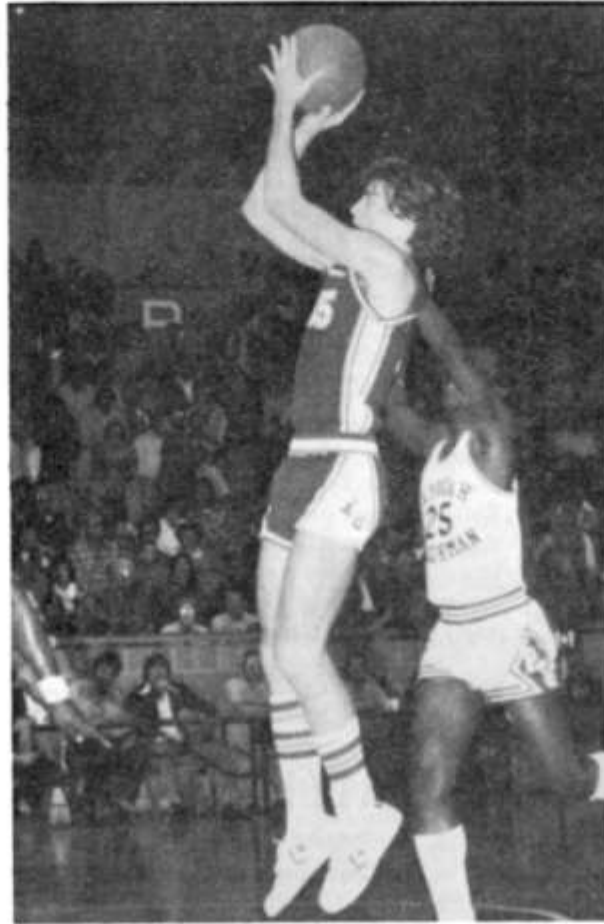
