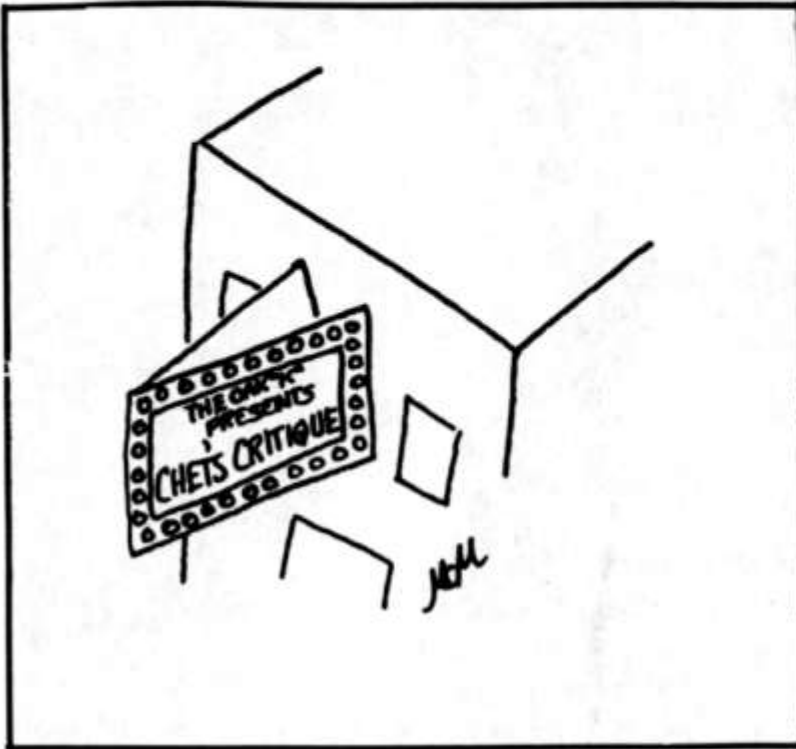
Miller, Shari Murphy, Kim Pleasant, Kim Stiles, seniors, and Susan Minton and Chet Overstreet, juniors.

## 78 - 79 ACT Test Dates Set

Five weekend mornings during this school year will probably be especially important to Lone Oak seniors who are thinking about continuing their education after graduation.

Those Saturday mornings—the first of which is October 21—are national test dates for taking the test section of the ACT Assessment Program. The registration deadline for the October 21 national test date is September 22. 1978-79 ACT Assessment Program national test date and registration dates schedule is:

Test Dates	Registration Periods
Oct. 21, 1978	Aug. 7-Sept. 22
Dec. 9, 1978	Oct. 9-Nov. 10
Feb. 10, 1979	Nov. 27-Jan. 12
April 7, 1979	Jan. 29-March 9
June 23, 1979	March 26-May 25

At area test centers on those dates it takes students about three hours to complete four exams (English, math, social studies, natural sciences) that make up the ACT Assessment's test section. The other important section is a two-part questionnaire, which is completed at home by students as part of the program's registration process.

The basic student fee for using the program remains \$7.50 this year.

Information reports resulting from the test and questionnaire sections are sent to the students and their high school counselors and to colleges and other institutions specifically designated by the students.

If students are uncertain if they need to use the ACT Assessment, or concerned about location of the nearest ACT test center, they are urged to contact Mr. Griffith in the office. Students can also obtain the ACT Assessment registration packets, as well as other college and career planning materials, from the counseling office.

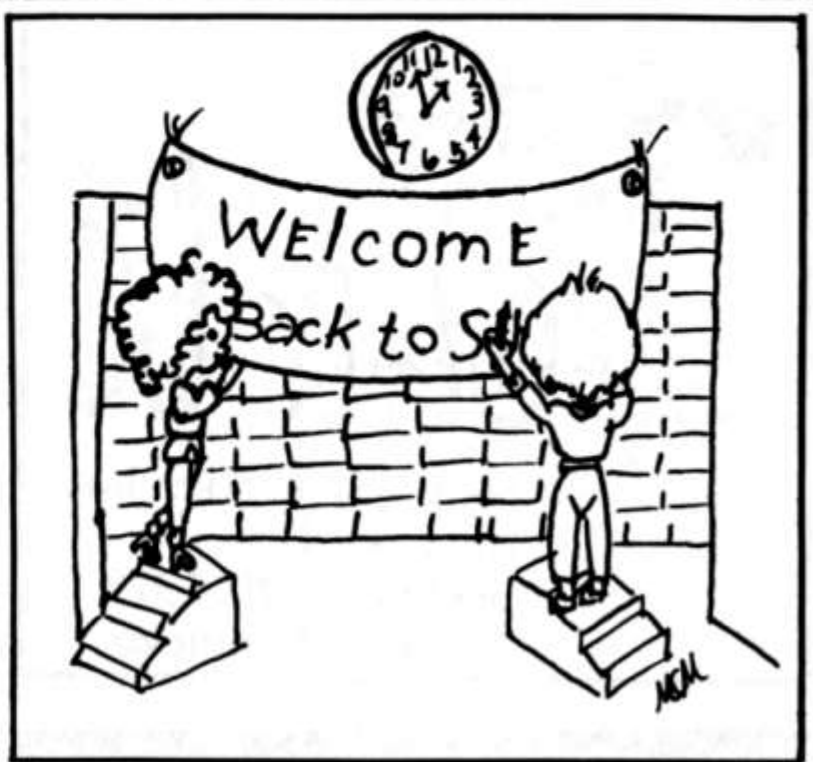
## Is Our Enthusiasm At Its Peak?

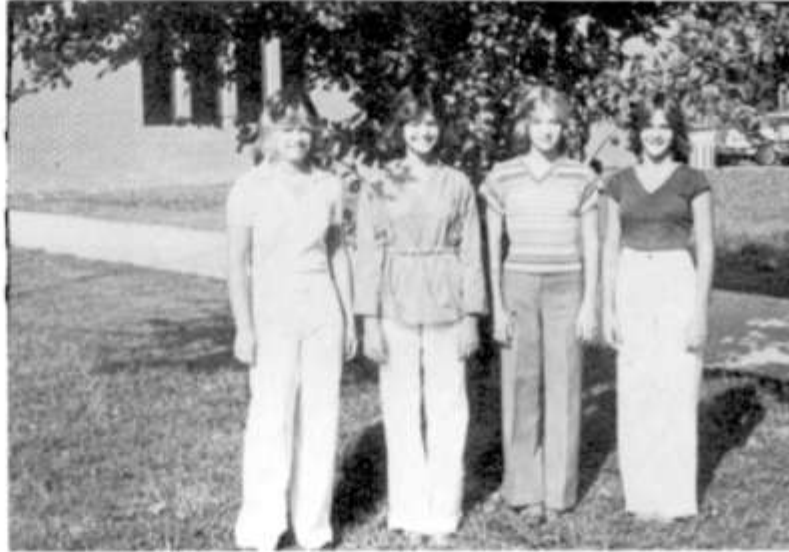
# Morris Visits Physical Science Club

"I found the meeting very interesting and enjoyed the businessmen of the Paducah area," was Greta's reply.

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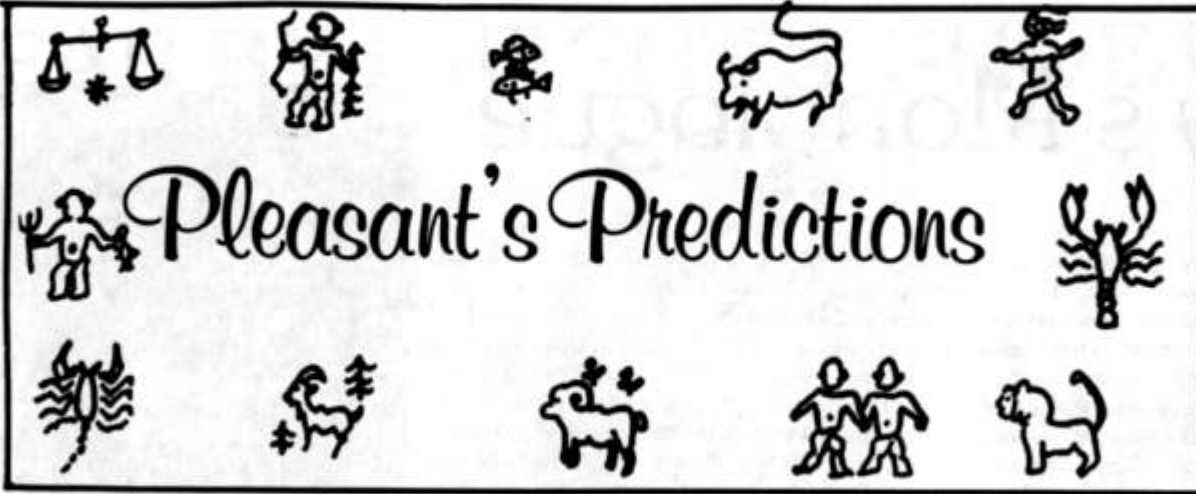
