# Will Lone Oak Become A 'City'?

A group of Lone Oak citizens filed a petition in McCracken County Circuit Court calling for a one-half square mile area of Lone Oak to be established as an incorporated community of the sixth class. The half-a-square-mile area proposed for incorporation surrounds the intersection of U.S. 45 and South Friendship Road.

The petition, filed on Tuesday, May 1, asks that the corporate sixth-class city be called Lone Oak. It states 495 people live within the area, 195 of which are registered voters who can legally sign the petition. The petition also states 179 persons, which is considerably more than the 134 required, supported the plan by giving their signatures.

The citizens group asks Emery to appoint persons to fill the positions of trustees, town marshal, and assessor, as provided by state law. The petition lists seven Lone Oak residents who have expressed a desire to fill these posts. They are Hubert Smithson, Leroy Alfred Robinson, Leslie B. Vaughn, Paul Lane May, Richard Dwayne Boyd, Robert Norman Steele and Robert Padgett.

Local attorneys Bob Manchester and John Carneal filed the petition on behalf of the group. Manchester said if incorporated the city would remain sixth-class until the next General Assembly designates it a proper classification with respect to population. He also stated Lone Oak residents outside the area can seek annexation into the city of Lone Oak, provided there is not 50 percent opposition among residents affected. He said the ultimate goal of the group is to eventually become a fourth-class city since "obviously there are more than 3,000 people living there".

Carl Ligon, a Lone Oak businessman instrumental in the drive for incorporation, said Lone

Oak has taken the lead in establishing its own services such as fire protection and water, "but nobody, until now, has really had the time to keep it (the incorporation drive) going. We hope to establish a self-governing body here".

Group spokesmen Glen Campbell, Smithson, and E.R. Hibbs said several tries to incorporate the community have failed because there was not enough organization, legal assistance and initiative to push them to a conclusion.

The spokesmen said the proposed incorporation area is clearly separate from land recently annexed by Paducah. Also, they said, although discussion has included incorporation to stop Paducah from annexing the remainder of Lone Oak, such reasoning has not been a major factor in the drive. Hibbs said the desire to keep Lone Oak and Paducah separate always has been strong but "that was the least thing talked about in any of our meetings".

The board of trustees established by incorporation would be responsible for setting a tax rate and deciding how revenue will be used, the men said. They said the board will designate the use of funds not taken by the records-keeping system, but the incorporation is not sought to solve major existing problems in Lone Oak.

"Services for corporate Lone Oak would remain the same as services in other areas of the county," Manchester said. Additional services, such as police protection aside from that provided by the county, would probably be prohibited by cost factors, the spokesmen added.

"We've got a really progressive little town, and there is virtually everything in Lone Oak offered to its citizens that is offered to people in Paducah," Campbell said.

It is a movie about the street gangs in New York City and the attempts of one man to unite them. The plot involves the man being shot and the blame being placed on the Warriors. The Warriors must make their way 27 miles from the Bronx back to Coney Island, their territory. The only problem is they are being chased by 100,000 sworn enemies, the other gangs. The Paducah Drive-In has lined up new movies but will also be playing movies that have come on before.

# Lone Oak - Hendron Boundaries Set

Boundary lines have been established for the new Lone Oak-Hendron and the present Lone Oak Elementary schools. Elementary students who live east of U.S. 45 will attend the newly built, air-conditioned Hendron-Lone Oak Elementary School when it opens at the beginning of the next school term. Elementary students who live west of U.S. 45 will attend the present Lone Oak Elementary School.

Members of the McCracken County Board of Education voted unanimously on May 2 to establish the elementary school boundary lines. According to Assistant Superintendent Tilford Underwood, there has not been any opposition to the change in boundary lines. The new school is

located on Bleich Road and will replace Hendron Elementary School. It is also intended to help eliminate over-crowding at Lone Oak Elementary School.

Sixth grade students on both sides of the highway will attend Lone Oak Middle School next year, according to Underwood. Presently, sixth graders in the Hendron district attend Hendron Elementary School. However, Lone Oak sixth grade has been located in the middle school for several years.

Hendron Elementary presently has about 120 students in grades one through five. The new school is expected to have approximately 450 students enrolled ranging from kindergarten up to the fifth grade when the new school year begins in August.

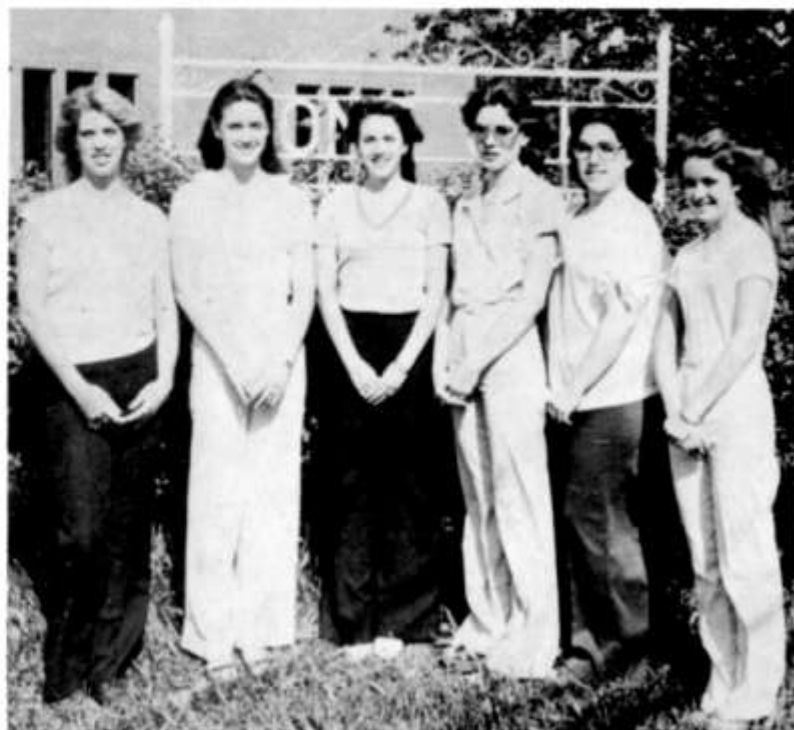

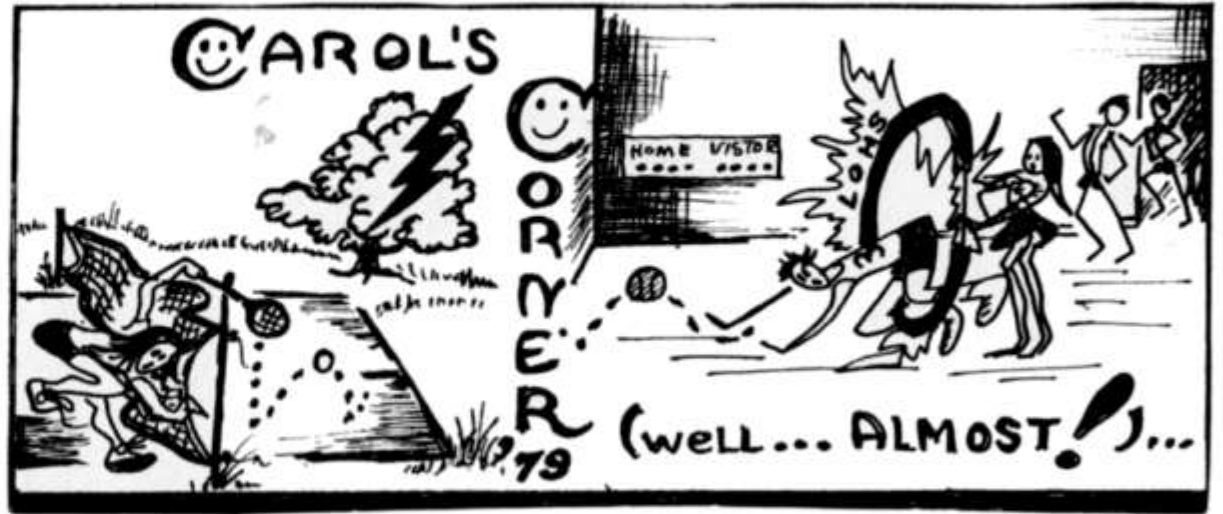

Bobby Dowell and Ken Hancock were the co-captains of the football team. Hancock was voted Most Valuable Player and Most Valuable Defensive Linebacker. Randy Hoxworth received an All-State Honorable Mention, the Most Valuable Defensive Back Award and a Hardnose Award. John Rinella earned the Richard Byrd Award and the Most Valuable Offensive Lineman Award. John Paul Felker was chosen as the Most Valuable Offensive Back, and David Watts was picked as the Most Valuable Defensive Lineman. Terry Quinlan was awarded the Sportsmanship Trophy and a Hardnose Trophy. Roger Cooper, Greg Stevens, and Bruce Tucker, each won a Hardnose Award, while Kevin Cook, Bobby Crissman, and Chris Rothemeyer, each received the Senior Awards.

Five seniors led the boys basketball team, which Coach Don Butler said was the most unselfish group that he has ever coached. Bruce Dreher, a two-year starter, pumped in 16.7 points and 10 rebounds per outing. The 6'1 forward was chosen as Lone Oak's Most Valuable Player in the District Tournament and was Nominated for McDonald's All-American Team. 6'5 reserve center Shane Ellington averaged 5 points and five rebounds a game. Trackster Bob Crissman broke a school record in the discus with a 130 feet, 7 inches throw. He also won third place in the West Kentucky Conference Track Meet in the discus. John Rinella is one of the best shotput throwers at Lone Oak, according to Coach Tony McGroarty.

"The baseball seniors have shown leadership by working hard and having a good attitude," acknowledged Coach Jim Mizell. All six seniors earned starting positions this fall. Charles Bechtold and Bobby Dowell played second base and catcher, respectively. Four-year starter Dean Hayes rotated at pitcher, third base and outfield. He received the Best Pitcher Award last year. Jay Jeffrey, a two-year starter, plays centerfield and won the Mr. Hustle Trophy last year. Daniel Reynolds, who caught last year, was at first base this year. David Tinsley, a two-year starter at left field, tied for the best batting average last year.

Seniors, you will be missed greatly in next year's athletic endeavors.
