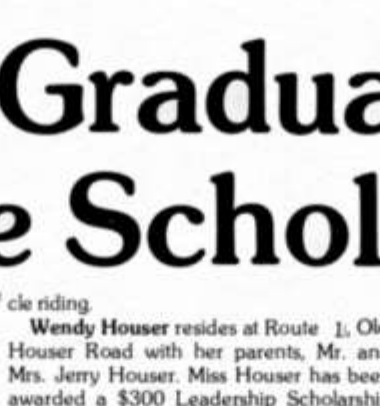

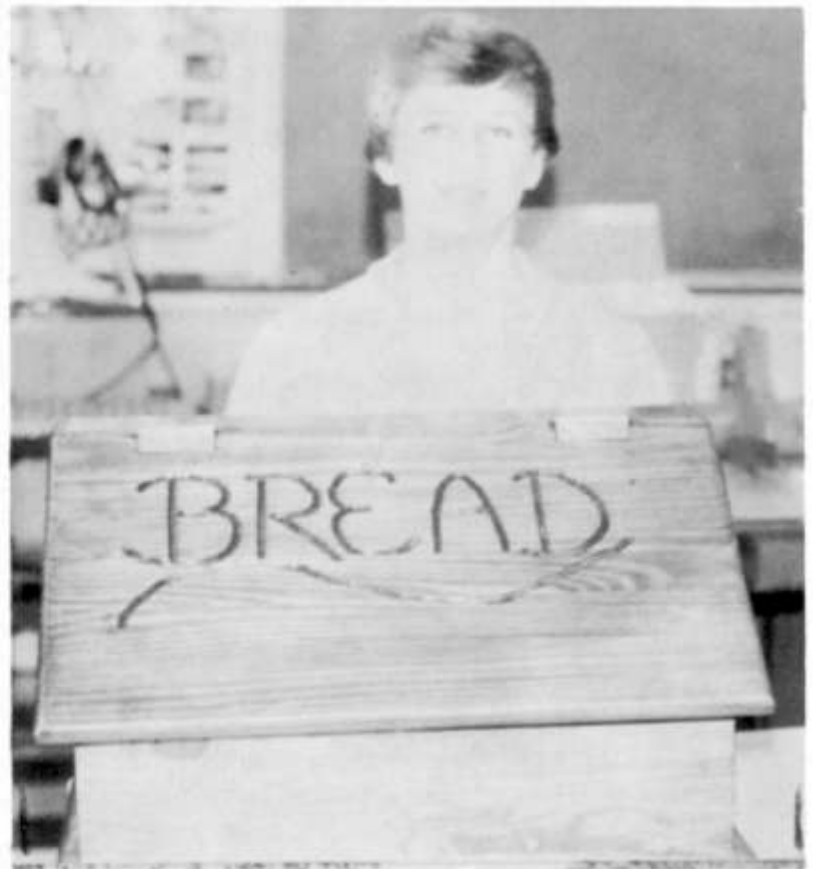
Industrial Arts Awards 14

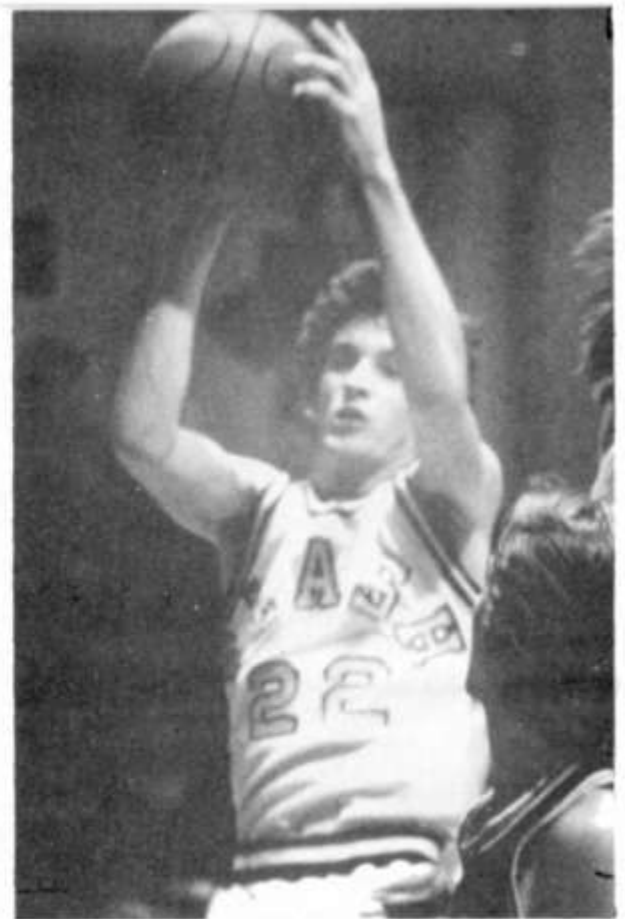

St. Mary 9 Lone Oak 8

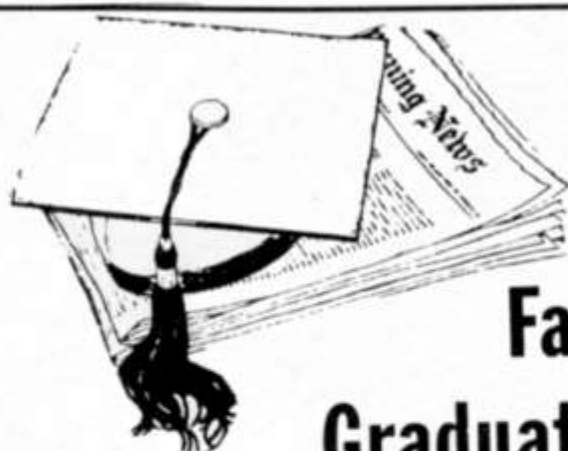
