He plans to prepare for this by studying sample tests. Believing that being a National Merit Semifinalist will increase his possibilities for higher education, Peter will apply for the many scholarships offered by this program.

Rebecca feels that being a National Merit Semifinalist is an excellent opportunity to improve her chances for a good scholarship. She is required by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation to fill out forms and write an essay about her achievement. She plans to prepare for the SAT by studying math and English extensively with the aid of books written about the SAT. She is hoping to get a scholarship from both Cornell University and National Merit.

Philip Womble and Kevin Clark have been designated as commended students in the 1984 National Merit Scholarship Program, based on their outstanding test performance. They are in the top five percent of over one million participants in the twentyninth annual Merit Program.




Theodore Peshehonoff has been chosen as this month's Junior Rotarian.


As the 1983-'84 school year opens, Ione Oak High School has in it's midst ε Swedish foreign exchange student by the name of Lars Ribbefjord.

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
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Tennis season has begunwith round robin tournaments

Oakers win 2 of first 3 games

For the third year in a row, the Lone Oak Purple Flash won its first game of the year by beating the Ballard Bombers 14-0.

Led by Ethan Taylor, who rushed for 66 yards, and Theodore Peshehonoff, who gained 65 yards on the ground, Lone Oak established its running attack early in the game. The Flash's first two drives featured Taylor and Peshehonoff consistently getting good yardage up the middle. On the Flash's second drive, junior quarterback Troy Dowdy hit senior tight end Eric Coleman for a 22-yard gain to the Bomber 20. On the next play, Taylor scored to give Lone Oak a 6-0 lead. J.D. Over-

ton's pass to Jeff Holland made the score 8-0. In the second half, a one yard run by John Myers finished the scoring.

One week later, the Flash met Paducah Tilghman. Trailing 7-0 in the second quarter, Lone Oak put together a long scoring drive, ending in Taylor's touchdown. But the missed extra point attempt kept the Oakers from tying the game. The second half proved to be the downfall, however, as five second-half turnovers contributed to four more touchdowns, two in each quarter, to make the final score 35-6.

After that loss, the Lone Oak took on perennial county champs Heath. But the Pirates were denied the county title this yar, losing 19-7.



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Most of the first half was a defensive struggle, but Lone Oak finally put together a 10-play, 52-yard drive ending on Dowdy's three-yard run with over seven minutes left in the second quarter. In the third quarter, Taylor swept around the right end for 69 yards to put the Flash ahead 12-0. But only three minutes later, Heath's Michael Carter scored to pull within five at 12-7. Heath had a chance in the last two minutes to take the lead, but junior Brian Howard intercepted a desperation pass near midfield and ran it back to within inches of the goal line. Flash increase record 3-2

Lone Oak scored four touchdowns in the second half to defeat the Calloway County Lakers 35-20 in Murray, September 16.

In the third quarter, Lone Oak put together three scoring drives led by junior quarterback Troy Dowdy and fullback Taylor. The first score came on a 27-yard run by Taylor. This enabled Lone Oak to take a 14-12 lead. Lone Oak increased its lead with a 7-yard pass from Dowdy to Taylor. The third scoring drive in the quarter was set up by a Calloway fumble and ended with a 9-yard pass from Dowdy to Taylor. This made the score 28-12.

In the fourth quarter, each team scored. Lone Oak put on the finishing touches with a 9-yard run by senior Tony Holifield. Calloway scored late in the quarter, but time ran out and Lone Oak raised its winning record to 3-1.


Lone Oak vs. Marshall Co.
