Poll results in: How do seniors measure up?

Before seniors leave LOHS and move on to bigger and better things, *The Oak K* decided to give a poll only for seniors. The poll was given to all 180 seniors; 124 responded to questions about high school, college, and their future. The following are the results.

Is the senior class a good example? They certainly think so. 75% said that their class was a good example for the rest of the student body to follow. 19% felt that their class had a prob-

lem with alcohol.

Where do you stand? Seniors were asked which diploma they will be receiving when they graduate. 48.4% of polled seniors said that they would receive the standard diploma, 24.2% the enrichment, and 27.4% the comprehensive. The average admitted GPA of the senior class was 2.87.

What are your plans for college? 75.8% of polled seniors have plans to attend college. 11.3% said they will attend a trade or technical school.

8.9% plan to pursue other options, such as the military. 1.6% said they will not further their education. 2.4% are uncertain.

How are you paying for college? Parents will fill the bill for 40% of seniors. 36.6% plan to pay with loans, scholarships and grants. Working for tuition was less popular with 18.8%. 3.5% will use the military. And, rounding out the top five, robbing little old ladies stole 1.1%.

How much money do you expect to make? The average

expected income for the senior class was \$54,216.37. 62.2%

expected to earn more money than their parents, 17.9% the same and 19.8% less.

Of those who plan to attend college, the average GPA was 2.98, .11 higher than the av-

erage. Their average income was \$56,506.94 a year. That is over \$2000 dollars a year more than the average for the entire class and \$38,106.94 more than those who do not plan to further their education. 62.2% said that they will make more money than their parents, 15.8% the same and 22% less. That means that those se-

niors who plan to attend college are more likely to say that they would make less than their parents. Are these people pessimistic or just honest?

Of those who did not plan to further their education, the average GPA was 1.5. The average expected income was 18,400. 100% expect to earn less than their parents.

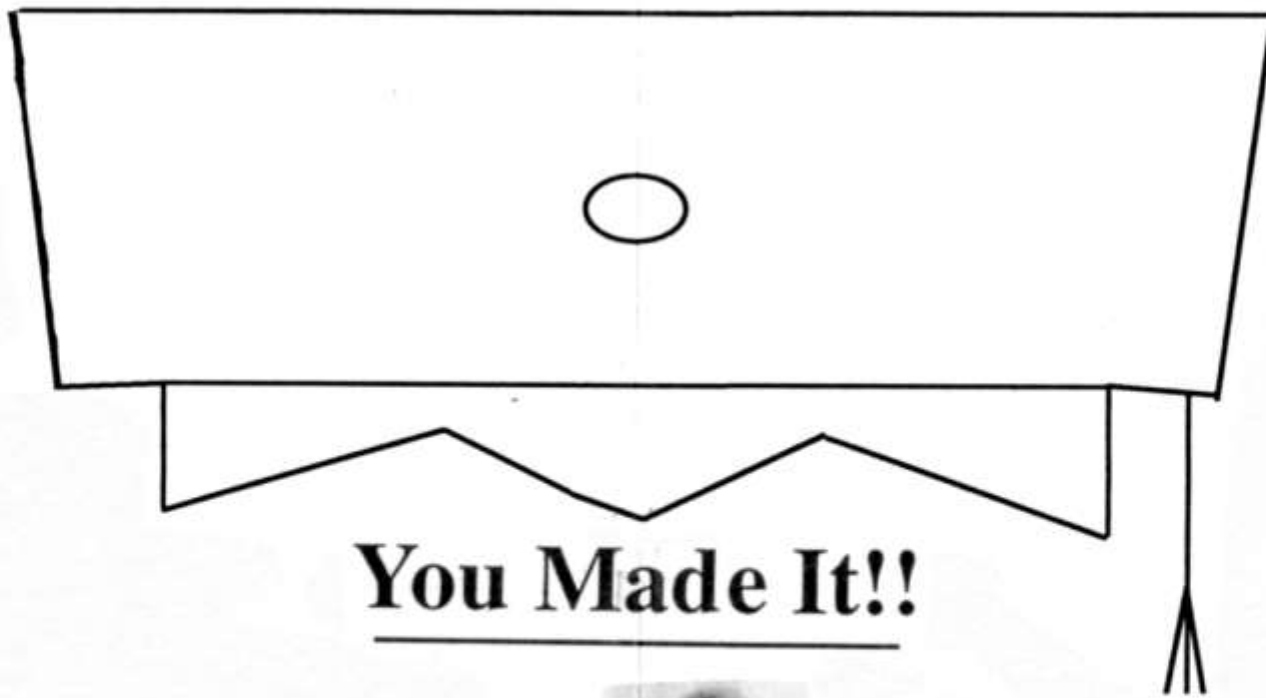

To all of you who have at least one year of high school- make the best of it while you have a chance. It goes by so fast that you can hear the clock ticking.

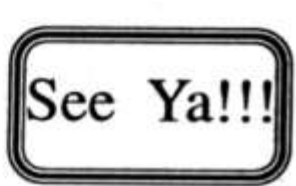
Thanks to all the readers for your support and criticism. Your opinion matters, too!

Also I wish to thank the journalism staff, for being such quiet little angels, and such re-

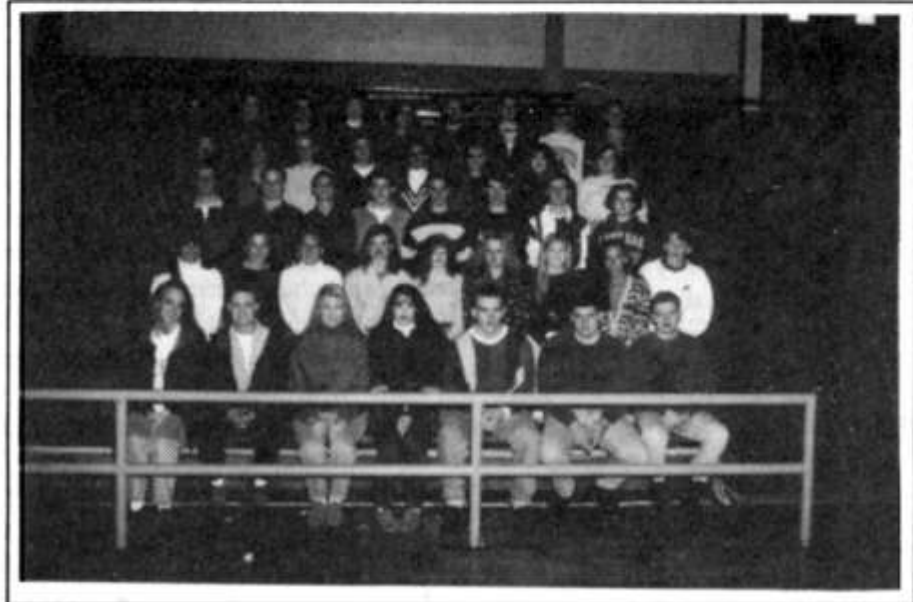

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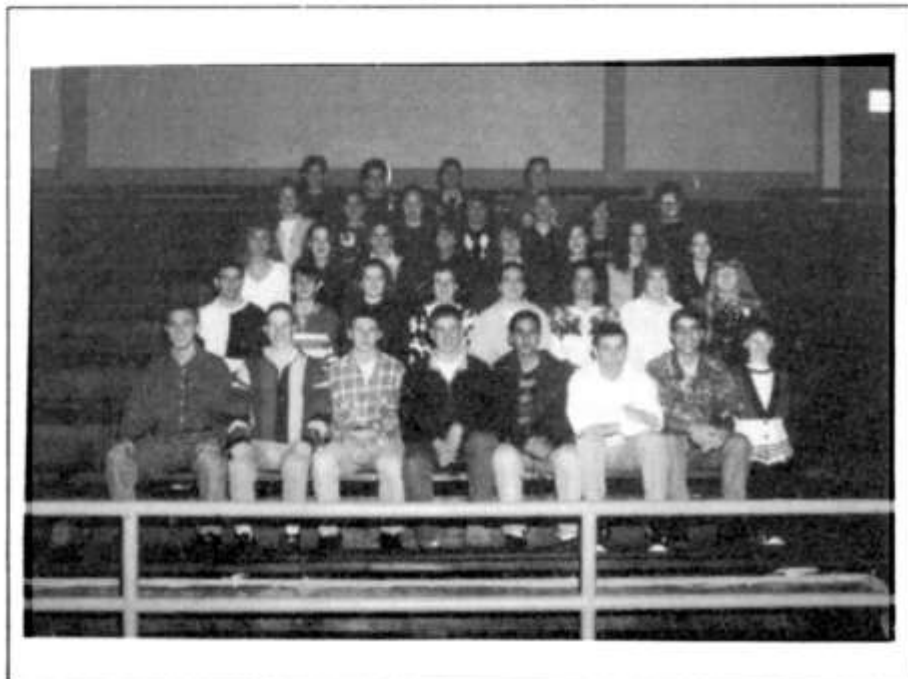
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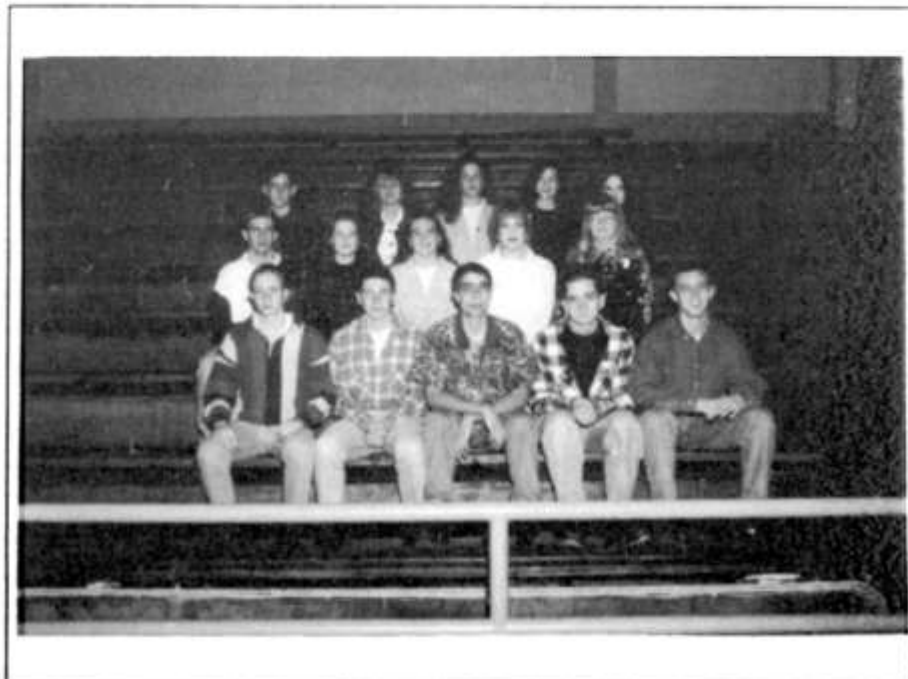
