

## A tribute to the past

# Today compared to the 1970's

"We are destroying the environment now more than ever." "Women still aren't as educated as men." "More people are smoking now than ever." These are all common misconceptions people of today have about our society and its surroundings. In the January 29 issue of Time magazine the America of 1970 was compared to its current counterpart and some of these statistics may shock you. Information on everything from the rate of inflation to the percentage of women between the ages of 30 and 34 who aren't married was given. The information found about the always improving environment and changes in education was most compelling.

In the area of education men are falling behind women badly, while tuition costs are rising, and more people are receiving degrees. Annual tuition at a private four-year college has jumped over the last twenty years from \$6,283 to \$11,490. The percentage of Americans who complete four years of college has doubled from 11% in 1970 to 22% in the 1990's. Women's shares of BA's (Bachelor of the Arts) and doctoratres have both risen as females now hold 53% of the BA's and 40% of the

doctorates.

The environment is dealing with a lot less of two of its biggest nemesis as it heads into the nineties. U.S. sulfur-dioxide emissions are down about 30% from 31 million tons in 1970 to a current amount of only 21 tons. Carbon-monoxide emissions are also down, from 128 tons to 98 tons.

Despite the fact that people are earning less in the nineties, spending on a number of goods and services is up. Average weekly earnings in 1982 dollars have decreased from \$298 in 1970 to \$257 in this decade. Even though earnings are down the percentage of families with two cars has doubled and the number of people traveling to Europe has increased from 2.9 million to 7.5 million. There are now 2.2 televisions per household compared to 1.4 in 1970 with the number of cable subscriptions going up only slightly from 4.5 million in 1970 to 58 million in the nineties.

As we head for the twenty-first century more changes are sure to be waiting for society. These figures have briefly shown that change isn't necessarily a bad thing, however, our generation's ability to adapt to change will be paramount to our future lifestyles.

## Lady Flash roll over Heath, boys lose a squeaker

The Lone Oak boys basketball team lost their second heartbreaker this season to Heath, losing 48-46, while the Lady Flash defeated Heath for the second time this season, pounding the Lady Pirates, 72-43.

The boys came out poised to win a big district victory on their homecourt. They led throughout most of the game, including a three point lead with three minutes to go, until the Pirates made a key 7-2 run in the fourth quarter to grab the victory. The loss

snapped a two game winning streak for the Flash, dropping their record to 3-13 overall and 1-5 in the district.

"Even though we lost, I was proud of our effort," said head coach Craig Wallace. "We had several players who were a little 'under the weather,' but they showed tremendous heart and tried to help us any way they could."

Donnie Stone led Lone Oak with 19 points. Justin Duncan scored 12, and Kyle Sanderson added 11. Josh Long went scoreless, partly due to the fact that he had the flu. Cameron Ikeard sat out the game with an injury.

Now the Flash await a battle against state power and cross-town rival, Tilghman, in the first round of the Second District Tournament.

Despite Lone Oak's losing record, fan support has remained strong. "Our fans have been real supportive and understanding towards our young team," said Wallace. "We are going to work hard to ensure they have a lot to cheer for next year!"

The Lady Flash blitzed Heath behind a strong performance by Amanda Mitchell, who scored 19 points, grabbed 11 rebounds, and blocked two shots. Kelly Sanders added 16, while Kristie Garrett scored nine points and dished out a team-high six assists.

"In some stretches we played about as well as we can play," said head coach Steve Cobb. "Our players completely demoralized Heath with their intensity and execution. I was very pleased with every aspect of our performance."

Lone Oak was never seriously threatened on their way to their fourth straight victory. They jumped out to a 31-14 halftime lead and led by as many as 34 at the end of the third quarter. The win improved Lone Oak to 8-8 overall and 4-2 in Second District play.

Cobb called this game a "total team effort." Twelve players saw action during the game, with eight getting at least 18 minutes of playing time, while no one played over 22.

Next up for the Lady Flash is the district tournament, where they will meet Heath for the third time. A victory will put them in the Regional Tournament for the first time in two years. In order to advance in post-season play, Cobb believes his team must continue to play intelligently, pressure the ball, and rebound. Most importantly, though, they need to finish plays. He noted that seven different players missed wide open

lay-ups in the first half against Heath.

Fan support, however, has been down for the Lady Flash this season. Cobb had this to say about the low attendance: "I wish more people would come out and support them because they are an entertaining team to watch, and they are playing pretty well right now."
