# **Probable donation** would open engineering doors

With an updated 21<sup>st</sup> century county school in sight, Lone Oak High School is exploring opportunities to increase student elective classes. Thanks to a very generous community member, an engineering program was presented to the SBDM January 20th to help LOHS take the "lead" in the McCracken County School District in offering new and exciting courses for its students.

Project Lead the Way, by definition, "centers on developing better problem solving skills by immersing students in real-world engineering problems." It was this program, which is currently being utilized in both Trigg and Marshall Counties, that inspired an unnamed member of our community to offer enough money to purchase all of the equipment needed to start a chapter at LOHS.

It was after hearing of this offer that Principal Brian Harper met with Bill Murphy, who is Director of the UK Engineering Program at WKCTC to learn about the training that is required to be eligible to teach the first phase of PLTW, "Introduction to Engineering." In order to be prepared to teach this course, a two week program must be taken.

There are a number of courses that follow "Introduction..," and depending on interest and enrollment in the first year course, the engineering program should take off.

Harper stressed the need for engineers nation-wide as a key to getting this program started. "Having Project Lead the Way instilled in our school would afford students the opportunity to experience the field before making decisions concerning college majors and things of that nature. It is important to begin developing an interest in engineering before reaching the college level."

Not only would the program benefit students beginning next school year, but starting it this early would allow administration to learn techniques that work and don't work, as well as provide information on how many students show interest in the program as they plan for the future.

Nothing is set in stone as of today, but if all goes according to plan, Lone Oak High School should be able to boast our district's first engineering program. If the program proves to be successful, nothing should stand in the way of having Project Lead the Way in the consolidated county school.

# bama takes office

The January 20 inauguration of Barack Obama was a significant one for many reasons. As the first African American to ever be elected president of the United States, Obama's inauguration was a sign to many that America has passed a social milestone, and

Washington, D.C. met with massive crowds, eager spectators to what may turn out to be *the* event of 2009.

With over a million people in attendance, Obama's inauguration ceremony was the was one of the largest in history, along with the crowd of 1.2 million in the 1965 inauguration of Lyndon B. Johnson and the 1 million assembled in the snow for Kennedy in 1961. Tickets for this popular event, though distributed free by congressmen, ended up on eBay—some selling for as much as \$40,000

"We think it's absolutely insane to be selling those tickets, said Howard Gantman, staff director of the Joint Congressional Committee on Inaugural Ceremonies. While not illegal, the ticket selling was strongly discouraged, and judging by the response from other Committee members, it may become illegal in the future. Along with the spectators, security was extremely tight, with over 150 "intel teams" from 57 different government agencies, 8,000 police officers, 5,000 professional soldiers, thousands of National Guard members, and sharpshooters posted all throughout the area. The inauguration was dubbed a "National Special Security Event," and was certainly treated as such.

The cost of the ceremony, an estimated \$160 million dollars, was another record-breaker. However, it was not, as so many news sites were quick to claim, four times the expense of Bush's 2005 ceremony. This comparison is based on the approximated \$42.7 million for the swearing-in and the following social activities, while Obama's \$160 million figure includes security costs. Bush's expenses, including security, are calculated to be about \$157 million. Fixed statistics of the lower media sources aside, it appears that there's not so much a difference in cost after all. Nevertheless, some critics believe that, in light of our current economic condition, a bit more restraint would have been prudent.

As to whether the proceedings lived up to the attendee's expectations or not, responses are somewhat varied. Only about 45%, according to a survey by msn.com, were greatly impressed by Barack Obama's address. Elizabeth Alexander's poem, "Praise Song for the Day," surprisingly enough, was met with mixed reactions as well. One of the ceremony's more memorable moments, of course, came at the end of Joseph Lowery's discursive and somewhat muddled benediction, as he made rhymes relating to the colors associated with various races. No doubt those will become something of a meme in the days to come.

Will January 20, 2009 become one of the more memorable of the generation? Many seem to think so. How will we look back on it from the other side of Barack Obama's presidential term? That's a bit more difficult to say.

# **Blagojevich Scandal Causes Stir**

The circus act known as the Rod Blagojevich scandal is now spiraling well into January. Since December 9<sup>th</sup>, 2008 the media and the state of Illinois have been in frenzy over the charges brought up against Illinois Democratic Governor Rod Blagojevich. Mr. Blagojevich stands accused of attempting to sell the empty Illinois Senate seat left by President Barack Obama. He is formally charged with conspiracy to commit mail and wire fraud and solicitation of bribery.

The initial charges brought against Blagojevich by a federal prosecutor are only part of this full-blown, media covered scandal. He has, at the time of this article, yet to be indicted on any charges though his trial proceedings should soon be under way if they aren't already. He claims it is all political maneuvering.

Rounding off the Blagojevich fiasco is his recent impeachment by the Illinois State

Illinois legislators state the Blagojevich trial will not be a criminal proceeding. The trial in the Illinois State Senate will seek to determine whether the governor abused his power during his time in office and in addition to the charges already against him will try him on his unauthorized expansion of health care.

Further investigation into Blagojevich is warranted and may yet uncover more involved in his senate seat conspiracy.
















# Strange 2008 The Bak "%"







The song expresses the desire to keep a great relationship going.





# Where they stand: Flash basketball

Three quarters into the regular season, the boys' basketball team finds itself right in the thick of a topsy-turvy  $1^{st}$  region.

As the season began, uncertainty about bench play and competition within the region surrounded this .500 ballclub. With a number one seed at stake against Tilghman on Feb. 13<sup>th</sup>, it seems as though this team has performed at the level expected of them. 
