Major and minor behavior referrals went down per day as well, with minors falling by 1.34 and majors going

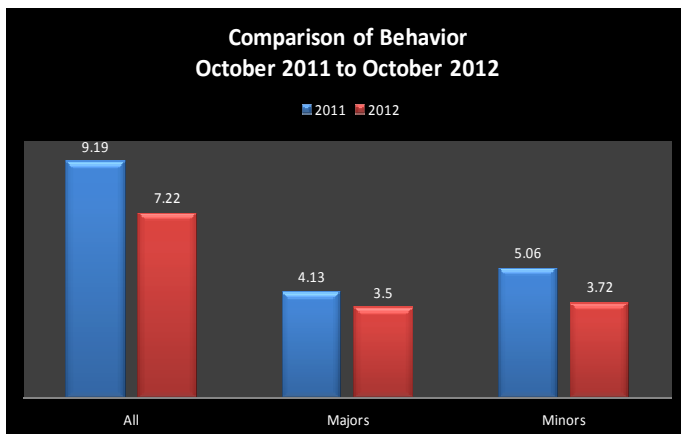
down slightly by 0.63.

Trends from September to October showed the same overall direction with a decrease from September of this year of 1.34 office referrals per day. Minor referrals were down an astonishing 1.84 while major referrals had a slight upswing of 0.5 per day.

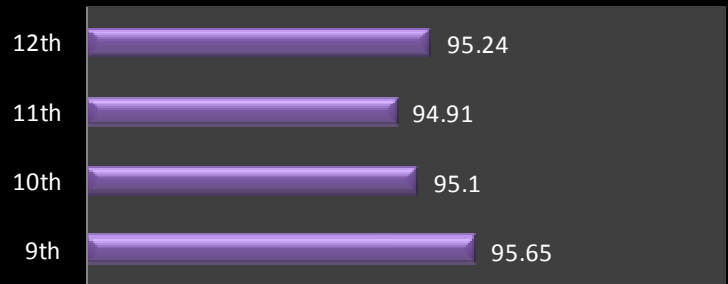
